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TOPIC: Transit Asset Management Targets for Fiscal Year 2021

DATE: May 15, 2020

STAFF MEMBER: Dave Meredith

Summary:

The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) published a final rule to define the term state of good repair (SGR) and to establish minimum Federal requirements for transit asset management (TAM) that will apply to all recipients and sub-recipients of chapter 53 funds that own, operate, or manage public transportation capital assets. This final rule requires public transportation providers to develop and implement TAM policies, plans, and targets.

Valley Regional Transit (VRT) approved the regional TAM Policy in September 2018 and the TAM Group Plan in January 2019. All TAM policies/plans must include an asset inventory, a condition assessment of inventoried assets, and a prioritized list of investments to improve the state of good repair of the regions public transportation capital assets.

Standard scoring criteria for condition assessments for regional public transportation assets was established and implemented according to the Scoring Criteria for Regional Public Transportation Policy approved by the VRT Board of Directors in September of 2016.

Participating agencies in the TAM Group Plan are VRT, Boise State and ACHD Commuteride. All participating agencies have agreed to follow the TAM Group Plan requirements, which requires: 1) Scoring of assets; 2) Analyzing scores based upon current and future needs to maintain service; and 3) Setting of targets for each category of assets.

TAM Targets

VRT staff uses fiscal year targets rather than aspirational targets over a horizon period. This allows VRT to get a better understanding of the baseline for all assets. Once the baseline is determined, it may be best to set aspirational targets. VRT sets TAM targets by category:

- Rolling Stock includes all passenger vehicles
- Equipment includes service vehicles, support vehicles and equipment over \$5,000
- Facilities includes operations and administration facilities, passenger facilities, and parking facilities

VRT bases rolling stock and equipment targets on the percentage of assets meeting or exceeding the Useful Life Benchmark. Facility targets are the percentage of facilities with a condition rating below an overall SGR score of 3.0. Therefore, a low target percentage is optimum in all cases.

The Useful Life Benchmark is the expected lifecycle of a capital asset for a particular transit agency's operating environment, or the acceptable period of use in service for a particular

transit agency's operating environment. FTA provides default useful life benchmarks for vehicles.

The TAM Targets attachment indicates how the TAM Group Plan participants and the region is doing in meeting its targets. A low target percentage is optimum. The table shows a negative variance when targets are not met. It shows the following data for each category:

- Actual performance since FY17;
- Performance results for current year;
- Difference or variance between the target set and the actual performance for current year; and
- The next fiscal year's target.

Findings

- Rolling Stock We met our target for FY20 and propose the same target to continue to improve our rolling stock for FY21
- Equipment We met our target for FY20 and propose the same target to continue to improve our equipment for FY21
- Facilities We met our target for FY20 and propose the same target to continue to improve our facilities for FY21
- Overall Staff found significant variances from FY19 to FY20 scoring. The overall
 reasons for the variance included staffing changes and a different understanding of
 how to score a rolling stock asset. Because of the variance it was determined that
 FY19 scores were going to be used for FY20 for rolling stock only and that changes
 will be made to the TAM Plan before scoring again

Staff Recommendation/Request:

Action item. Staff requests that the Regional Technical Advisory Committee recommend the COMPASS Board of Directors approve the regional transit asset management targets for FY2021.

Implication (policy and/or financial):

An inventory of assets and their corresponding SGR score will help to determine the capital projects for the FY21 budget.

Topic: Communities in Motion 2040 2.0 Amendment

Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff seeks a recommendation for COMPASS Board of Directors adoption of Resolution X-2020 (attached) amending *Communities in Motion 2040 2.0* (CIM 2040 2.0).

Background/Summary:

Long-range transportation plans, such as CIM 2040 2.0, can only include projects that have funding identified to pay for them. When funding is identified to pay for previously unfunded projects, the long-range transportation plan must be amended to add these projects. COMPASS is proposing to add an environmental study for a State Highway 45 realignment in the City of Nampa to the list of funded projects in CIM 2040 2.0, as requested by the City of Nampa. The project is summarized below.

The City of Nampa proposes to add a study to complete a National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) alternatives analysis to realign State Highway 45 (also known as 12th Avenue South) through the City of Nampa from Sheridan Avenue to 1st Street South, with connections to I-84 on Northside Boulevard. The city proposes to fund the project with local funds. Construction is considered "unfunded" at this time. COMPASS staff will also request that the COMPASS Board of Directors amend the FY2020-2026 Regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) to add this project as a funded study in the TIP.

A public comment period on this proposed change, as well as proposed changes to the FY2020-2026 TIP, was held May 5 through 19, 2020. Verbatim comments will be provided at the RTAC meeting. If warranted, COMPASS staff will recommend changes to the proposed amendment based on comments received.

Implication (policy and/or financial):

An amendment to *Communities in Motion 2040 2.0* is needed to enable work to begin on funded projects.

RESOLUTION NO. X-2020

FOR THE PURPOSE OF AMENDING COMMUNITIES IN MOTION 2040 2.0

WHEREAS, the Community Planning Association of Southwest Idaho has been designated by the Governor of Idaho as the metropolitan planning organization responsible for transportation planning in Ada and Canyon Counties;

WHEREAS, the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act, Title 23 United States Code Section 134, and Title 49 United States Code Section 5303 requires metropolitan planning organizations to prepare regional long-range transportation plans covering a period of no less than 20 years;

WHEREAS, the City of Nampa requested an amendment to *Communities in Motion 2040 2.0* to add a project to complete a National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) alternatives analysis to realign State Highway 45 (also known as 12th Avenue South) through the City of Nampa from Sheridan Avenue to 1st Street South, with connections to I-84 on Northside Boulevard. The City proposes to fund the project with local funds. Construction is considered "unfunded" at this time.

WHEREAS, the FAST Act, Title 23 United States Code Section 134, and Title 49 United States Code Section 5303 require projects contained in the regional long-range transportation plan to be financially constrained;

WHEREAS, the City of Nampa has funds available for the projects;

WHEREAS, the FAST Act, Title 23 United States Code Section 134, and Title 49 United States Code Section 5303 requires regional long-range transportation plans be developed and amended in consultation with all interested parties; and

WHEREAS, a public comment period was held between May 5 and May 19, 2020, and comments were shared with the COMPASS Board of Directors for consideration.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Community Planning Association of Southwest Idaho Board of Directors approves the amendment to *Communities in Motion 2040 2.0*.

Topic: Amendment to the FY2020-2026 Regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff seeks Regional Transportation Advisory Committee recommendation of COMPASS Board of Director's adoption of Resolution XX-2020 amending the FY2020-2026 TIP.

Background/Summary:

COMPASS Policy 2020-01, COMPASS Regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Amendments and Board Administrative Modifications, requires COMPASS Board of Directors' approval under the following situations and public involvement on the marked criteria:

1	Add new project	Х

A summary of the actions in the amendments is provided below, including a reference to the criteria number requiring an amendment from the table above. Financial details are provided in the resolution.

• The City of Nampa proposes to add a study to complete a National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) alternatives analysis to realign State Highway 45 (also known as 12th Avenue South) through the City of Nampa from Sheridan Avenue to 1st Street South, with connections to I-84 on Northside Boulevard. The city proposes to fund the study with local funds. Construction is considered "unfunded" at this time. COMPASS staff requests to amend the TIP to add the project. (TIP amendment criteria #1)

- The City of Caldwell proposes to change the scope of work on the I-84 Ustick Road Overpass to widen the overpass from two through lanes to four through lanes and a center turn lane. As part of the Interstate 84 widening project, the Idaho Transportation Department (ITD) will replace the Middleton Road and Ustick Road Overpasses. The new bridges will include wider pier structures to make room to widen the interstate underneath. The original intent was to design the replacement structures to be similar to the existing structures (two through lanes – one in each direction). The City of Caldwell requested ITD to widen the Ustick Road Overpass to include a five lane structure (two lanes in each direction and a turn lane in the middle) to enable concurrent widening of Ustick Road to the west and east of the interstate. The turn lane will allow stacking of traffic for left turns onto Nelson Lane and Aviation Way. The city is in negotiations with ITD regarding the final costs and sources of funds. The current estimates are provided as local funding, funded by the City of Caldwell's urban renewal district, with final funding and sources to be determined. COMPASS staff requests to amend the TIP to revise the scope of the project and add funds to cover the new scope. (TIP amendment criteria #3 and #7)
- ITD proposes to remove a project (Key Number 22246) to rehabilitate interstate ramps in the City of Boise. This project was intended to rehabilitate the ramps at Franklin Road near the Boise Towne Square Mall. However, the project was funded through an incorrect funding program. ITD plans to re-add the project in the future, as funding is available through the correct funding program. The current funds will be reprogrammed to other projects. COMPASS staff requests to remove this project from the TIP. (TIP amendment criteria #2)
- ITD estimates that the GARVEE project on I-84 between Caldwell and Nampa will realize a cost savings of \$34 million. On May 21, 2020, the Idaho Transportation Board voted to move those funds to the State Highway 16 corridor project (Key Number 20788): \$14 million to complete design of all phases and \$20 million towards the overall need for right-of-way. Right-of-way will still be short approximately \$15 million, and construction is considered "unfunded." Public comment is not required for this change. COMPASS staff requests to amend the TIP to use \$34 million in GARVEE funding from I-84 to State Highway 16. (TIP amendment criteria #7)

A public comment period on the first three of these projects was open May 5 through 19, 2020. Verbatim public comments are provided on the COMPASS website under "supplemental information" at http://www.compassidaho.org/people/rtacmeetings.htm. Seven comments were received; staff does not recommend changes based on public comment received.

COMPASS staff will seek COMPASS Board of Directors' adoption of Resolution XX-2020 on June 15, 2020.

Implication (policy and/or financial):

This amendment adds one project, removes one project, changes the scope and increases funding for one project, and increases funding for another project in the FY2020-2026 TIP to allow funding programs to be fully obligated.

WHEREAS, the Community Planning Association of Southwest Idaho desires to take timely action to ensure the availability of federal funds;

WHEREAS, the Community Planning Association of Southwest Idaho developed this amendment to the FY2020-2026 Regional Transportation Improvement Program in compliance with all applicable state and federal regulations; and

WHEREAS, the attached table details the amendment to FY2020-2026 Regional Transportation Improvement Program.

Topic: Transportation Management Area (TMA) Balancing

Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff seeks RTAC approval to balance the Surface Transportation Program (STP)-TMA program. Requests for funding were received from the Ada County Highway District (ACHD) and Valley Regional Transit (VRT).

Background/Summary:

Balancing the STP-TMA program is necessary because some project funding was reduced due to limited obligation authority and some projects have new cost estimates or change orders resulting in funding needs. The STP-TMA program currently has \$1,033,753 available due to a bid on an ACHD project coming in low.

COMPASS staff recommends programming available funds based on priorities outlined in the Balancing Policy for STP and Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) funds, approved by the COMPASS Board of Directors on February 25, 2019, which includes the following priorities:

- 1. Cover cost overruns/project needs in the construction phase for projects in the STP or TAP programs consistent with the original project scope
- 2. Remove or reduce an "advance construction" situation (where construction costs are spread over two or more funding years) on projects in the STP or TAP programs
- 3. Cover cost overruns/project needs or advance design or right-of-way phases on construction projects in the STP or TAP programs consistent with original project scope
- 4. Advance the construction phase on projects in the STP or TAP programs
- 5. Cover cost overruns/project needs or advance planning projects in the STP or TAP programs consistent with original project scope
- 6. Cover cost overruns/project needs in the construction phase on projects in non-STP or TAP programs consistent with original project scope
- Cover non-construction cost overruns/project needs or advance design or right-of-way phases on construction projects in non-STP or TAP programs consistent with original project scope
- 8. Cover cost overruns/project needs or advance planning projects in non-STP or TAP programs consistent with original project scope
- 9. Add new projects as prioritized by the COMPASS Board of Directors

Requests for STP-TMA funds (request letters provided in Attachment 1):

Two projects are underfunded due to limited obligation authority. Funding was changed from federal-aid to local participating funds in March 2020 in order to represent actual funding available. These projects are the top priority for funding.

- ACHD's Capital Maintenance, Phase 3, Boise Area FY2020 project (Key Number 19847) needs \$240,496 to match original programmed amount. Staff recommends fully funding this need.
- City of Eagle's Bicycle and Pedestrian Bridge over North Channel of Boise River project (Key Number 20841) needs \$63,000 to match original programmed amount. (Note: this project includes multiple funding sources.) Staff recommends fully funding this need.

In addition, VRT and ACHD have requested to increase funding for two projects, and ACHD has requested to advance design on three projects:

- VRT requested up to \$2 million per year to maintain public transportation assets in the
 Boise Urbanized Area system for the Transit Asset Management, VRT, Boise Area –
 FY2020 project (Key Number 19057). Funding would be used for assets identified in VRT's
 Transit Asset Management Plan with scores between 0.0 and 2.5. In December 2019, a
 total of \$92,000 was programmed toward this request, leaving a remaining need of
 \$1,908,000.
- ACHD requested \$147,000 to cover additional right-of-way costs on the **State Street and Collister Drive intersection** project (Key Number 13481) in the City of Boise. In February 2020, \$110,000 was programmed toward this request, leaving a remaining need of \$37,000.
- ACHD requested to advance design funds for the FY2021 Pavement Preservation and ADA projects (Key Numbers 20259, 19993, and 20080), if funding is available.

Details of the proposed programming changes are provided on the STP-TMA balancing worksheet in Attachment 2. A summary of the needs and requests and COMPASS staff recommendations are provided below.

- City of Kuna's **Pedestrian Improvements, Main Street, Avenue A to Avenue C** project (Key Number 20143) needs \$39,000 to match original programmed amount. Staff does not recommend funds for this project at this time.
- City of Eagle's Bicycle and Pedestrian Bridge over North Channel of Boise River project (Key Number 20841) needs \$10,000 to match original programmed amount. (Note: this project includes multiple funding sources.) Staff does not recommend funds for this project at this time.

Details of needs in the TAP-TMA program are provided on the balancing worksheet in Attachment 4. A summary of the needs are provided below; however, no funds are available for programming at this time. These needs will be further discussed in the next item (End-of-Year Plan and Redistribution Priorities).

Summary: Per COMPASS staff, \$92,000 funded so far in FY2020

As the Regional Public Transportation Authority (RPTA) for Ada and Canyon counties, Valley Regional Transit (VRT) is responsible for developing a list of funded and unfunded public transportation capital needs in the region. The VRT Board of Directors adopted the Transit Asset Management (TAM) Plan in 2018. The plan requires an analytical process to prioritize all regional public transportation assets. VRT uses this prioritization process to improve and maintain all public transportation assets in a State of Good Repair (SGR). The following outlines the process for asset management and the findings of our current replacement and maintenance priorities for capital required to support existing services in the region.

VRT adopted a policy to establish the TAM target of 2.5 for most of the asset categories. VRT defines the assets below 2.5 as either delayed replacement or deferred maintenance. VRT completed an analysis to determine the level of investment required to replace all assets under the 2.5 score in a five-year replacement/improvement scale. VRT score assets and update the analysis each year.

VRT staff provided the details of the analysis to the Regional Technical Advisory Committee (RTAC) on June 26, 2019. The information provided in the packet outlined the details of the annual investment required to reach the five-year replacement/improvement goal. The total need to address the capital backlog for the region is \$35 million. VRT has federal funding to address the issues in the small urban area. VRT requires up to \$2 million annually in additional federal funding in the large urban area to meet the replacement goal.

Recommendation/Request:

Based on the average annual need, <u>VRT requests up to \$2 million each year</u> to address assets in the Boise system with scores between 0.0 through 2.5. VRT would fund projects identified in the Transit Asset Management Plan including rollingstock replacement, CNG fueling system improvements, and infrastructure improvements. In addition, the projects represented in these categories are "shovel ready" and can be selected and scaled based on the additional federal funding secured. The local match

has been identified and is currently being secured through VRT's annual budgeting process.

Implication (policy and/or financial):

Maintaining public transportation assets in a state of good repair is critical to ensure the continuity and cost effective delivery of regional public transportation services. The asset management system provides a data-drive approach to achieving priorities that ensure assets are replaced at the optimal time.

Topic: End-of-Year Program and Redistribution Priorities

Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff seeks RTAC recommendation for COMPASS Board of Directors' approval of End-of-Year Program and redistribution priorities, provided in Attachment 1.

Background/Summary:

Federal highway funding not obligated within its program year must be returned to the Federal Highway Administration at the end of the fiscal year. The Idaho Transportation Department (ITD) develops an End-of-Year Program to ensure obligation of all available funds within programs statewide. Redistribution of unobligated funds from other states is also included in the End-of-Year Program. ITD divides available funding from redistribution based on Idaho Transportation Board Policy 4028:

- 12.6% of available funding provided to local agencies
 - o Urban entities receive one-half of the local funding
 - Large Urban areas (the Boise Urbanized Area) receive one-half of the urban funds
 - Small Urban areas (including the Nampa Urbanized Area) receive one-half of the urban funds
 - o Rural entities receive one-half of the local funding

Metropolitan planning organizations submit local prioritized needs to ITD for inclusion in the End-of-Year Program, as funding becomes available. COMPASS staff keeps an ongoing list of needs and budgets additional funding as cost savings on other projects are realized. Any remaining needs, as well as opportunities to advance projects, are added to the End-of-Year Program priority list. Analyses of projects on the needs list and sponsor requests were provided in the previous item (Transportation Management Area [TMA] Balancing).

Projects receiving funding through the End-of-Year Program and redistribution must be in the Transportation Improvement Program and ready to obligate funds immediately. There is not enough time to transfer funds from the Federal Highway Administration to the Federal Transit Administration in this process; therefore, some public transportation projects are ineligible for these funds.

Priorities:

COMPASS staff recommendations priorities for the End-of-Year Program based on the Balancing Policy for Surface Transportation (STP) and Transportation Alternative (TAP) Programs funds, approved by the COMPASS Board of Directors on February 25, 2019, which includes the following priority criteria:

- 1. Obtain 100% of the estimated allocation
- 2. Cover cost overruns/project needs on projects obligated in a previous year or currently under contract

- 3. Advance the construction phase of projects
- 4. Cover cost overruns/project needs or advance design or right-of-way phases on construction projects
- 5. Cover cost overruns/projects needs or advance planning projects

End-of-Year and redistribution funds are first made available to projects within each program. If there are not enough projects in the program ready for obligation, funds may become available for other programs (shown below as criteria #6).

- June 15, 2020 staff will request COMPASS Board of Directors to approve priority list for the End-of-Year Program and redistribution for the Surface Transportation Program in the TMA and Urban areas, as well as the Transportation Alternatives Program in the TMA
- June 25, 2020 Urban Balancing Committee determines priorities for small urban areas
- August 20, 2020 Idaho Transportation Board approves priorities statewide
- Mid-September 2020 ITD staff will notify COMPASS of available funds and actions taken

Implication (policy and/or financial):

Approval of End-of-Year and redistribution priorities by the COMPASS Board of Directors make these project eligible for obligation of funds, if funding becomes available. Background/Summary:

The TIP is updated annually, with a public involvement period in the summer and approval by the COMPASS Board of Directors in the fall. In preparation for public comment on the draft FY2021-2027 TIP, the draft project list is attached for your review in three formats. The first two include all projects (new, existing, and changed), while the third lists major changes and new projects only.

- <u>Draft FY2021-2027 TIP Detailed Project List</u> provides funding details and a description of each project, the full project list is provided on the COMPASS website under "supplemental information" at http://www.compassidaho.org/people/rtacmeetings.htm (72 pages).
- <u>Draft FY2021-2027 TIP Basic Project List (Attachment 1)</u> provides a summarized version of each project.
- <u>Major Changes List (Attachment 2)</u> provides a summary of new or removed projects, projects with advanced or delayed construction, and projects with major changes in scope, as compared to the FY2020-2026 TIP.
 - o Additional changes may still occur. The Major Changes List will be updated in a redline format and forwarded to you via email prior to public comment.

In addition, COMPASS staff maintains summarized worksheets for balancing purposes for each of the following programs:

- Surface Transportation Programs (STP) in the Boise and Nampa Urbanized Areas
- Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) in the Boise Urbanized Area
- Federal Transit Administration (FTA) programs in the Boise and Nampa Urbanized Areas

These worksheets are available upon request for a detailed financial review of projects within each program.

Notes:

- Key numbers for new projects are temporary and start with the letters "ORN" (for Office of Transportation Investment reference number).
- Some projects use Ada County Highway District key numbers, as they are locally funded and not included in ITD's tracking system, but are regionally significant. These key numbers start with "RD" or "IN."
- When construction for a project is beyond the first five years of the TIP, the year of construction is not always known. In those cases, you will see "PD" (for "preliminary development") instead of a specific project year. This serves as a placeholder until a project year is known.

Next Steps:

- June 15, 2020 Draft FY2021-2027 TIP to COMPASS Board of Directors for review
- July 13, 2020 Deadline for member agency comments
- August 3 through September 7, 2020 Public comment period
- August 11, 2020 Open house, format to be determined
- August 19, 2020 RTAC recommendation requested on FY2021-FY2027 TIP
- September 16, 2020 Adoption of the FY2021-2027 Idaho Transportation Investment Program requested from Idaho Transportation Board
- October 19, 2020 COMPASS Board action requested on FY2021-202 TIP

The FY2021-2027 TIP will not be official until adopted by the COMPASS and Idaho Transportation Boards and approved by Federal Highway Administration and Federal Transit Administration. The current FY2020-2026 TIP will remain in effect until final approval of the FY2021-2027 TIP, expected by December 31, 2020.

Agencies with new projects or major changes to current projects in the FY2021-2027 TIP cannot act on those changes until federal approval of the FY2021-2027 TIP is obtained. However, an amendment to the FY2020-2026 TIP may be processed for actions that need to occur prior to federal approval.

Topic: Communities in Motion 2050 (CIM 2050) Update and Next Steps

Request/Recommendation:

This is a discussion item only.

Summary:

With the second CIM 2050 public involvement survey set to launch on June 1, 2020, COMPASS will review the performance indicators behind the "what if" scenarios and outline the next steps in the development of the long-range transportation plan.

RTAC has been instrumental in the development of the survey, including:

January 22, 2020: RTAC identified values to be used in the survey on the "what if" scenarios, reflecting the results of the first survey in the fall of 2019.

February 26, 2020: RTAC reviewed the "what if" scenarios based on key findings from the first survey and provided input into implementation strategies for those scenarios.

March 18, 2020: RTAC reviewed the survey instrument.

At the RTAC meeting on May 27, 2020, COMPASS staff will outline how the results from this survey will be evaluated and used to develop the growth scenario that will be the basis for the long-range plan. This second survey will cap the process of the "Explore" phase of CIM 2050 and lead into the "Choose" phase (see Attachment 1).

The maps, graphics, and performance indicators included in the survey will enable the public to have a better understanding of the impact of these future scenarios on public finances, transportation, environmental quality, and more. As an example of the data used to evaluate the impact of the scenarios, staff will share the Fiscal Impact Analysis results (Attachment 2).

Receiving feedback from the public, with a clear understanding of the trade-offs of alternative futures and the implementation strategies needed to achieve that future, will help COMPASS develop the "preferred" growth scenario (CIM 2050 Vision) and transportation plan that reflect regional values and public support.

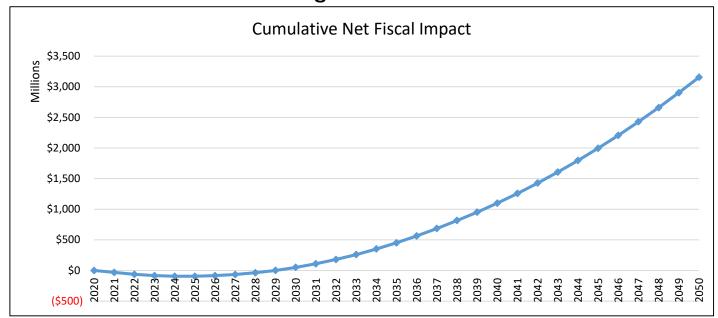
