## Communities in Motion 2040 2.0 Development Review

The Community Planning Association of Southwest Idaho (COMPASS) is the metropolitan planning organization (MPO) for Ada and Canyon Counties. COMPASS has developed this review as a tool for local governments to evaluate whether land developments are consistent with the goals of *Communities in Motion 2040 2.0* (CIM 2040), the regional long-range transportation plan for Ada and Canyon Counties. This checklist is not intended to be prescriptive, but rather a guidance document based on CIM 2040 2.0 goals.

## Recommendations

The proposal is near downtown Caldwell, with thousands of jobs within a walkable or bikeable distance. A site plan was not provided with this Comprehensive Plan amendment proposal, but a mixed-use development is described in the application. A mix of residential and commercial uses can mitigate congestion by decreasing the amount of single occupancy vehicle trips generated on the transportation network and encourage non-motorized travel. The proposal is served by a nearby regional bus route to downtown Boise. ValleyConnect plans for additional service to this location. Providing necessary infrastructure to ensure safe and accessible pedestrian, bicycle, to nearby employment centers and bus stops will be critical in minimizing the impact of new traffic on the area and encouraging non-motorized traffic. Work with Valley Regional Transit on design that would accommodate future service during the planning and design phase.
