Communities in Motion 2040 2.0 Development Review

The Community Planning Association of Southwest Idaho (COMPASS) is the metropolitan planning organization (MPO) for Ada and Canyon Counties. COMPASS has developed this review as a tool for local governments to evaluate whether land developments are consistent with the goals of *Communities in Motion 2040 2.0* (CIM 2040), the regional long-range transportation plan for Ada and Canyon Counties. This checklist is not intended to be prescriptive, but rather a guidance document based on CIM 2040 2.0 goals.

Recommendations

The location is an infill site in an employment-centric area, with thousands of jobs within a mile of the site, near a bus route and grocery store, providing opportunities for shorter vehicular trips and more non-motorized trips. The proposal requests new vehicle 39th Street and Comstock Avenue, rather than directly onto Garrity Boulevard. This access management approach will help efficiency on the corridor and reduce bicycle and pedestrian conflict points onto an arterial roadway. There is a bus stop is less than ¼ mile from this location. Providing pedestrian access from this development directly to Garrity Boulevard will improve transit access for residents.
