TOTAL POPULATION (2023 - projected)



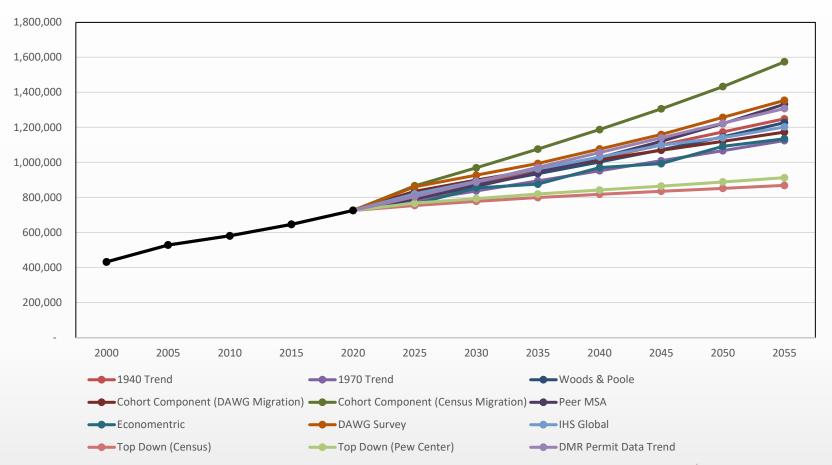

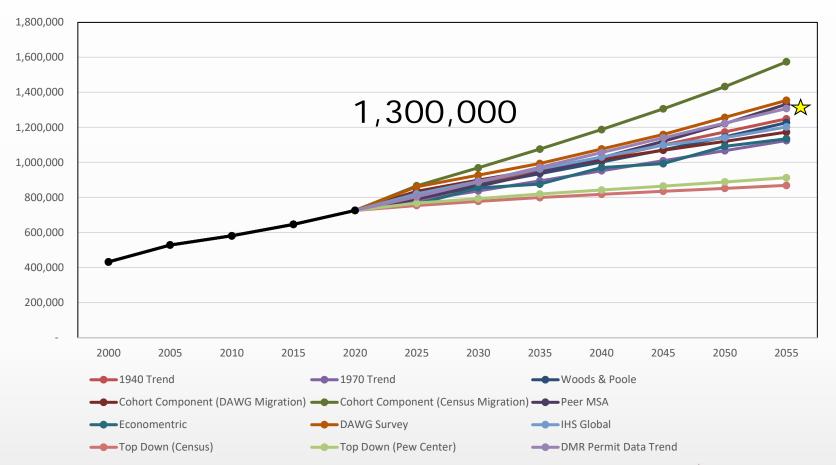

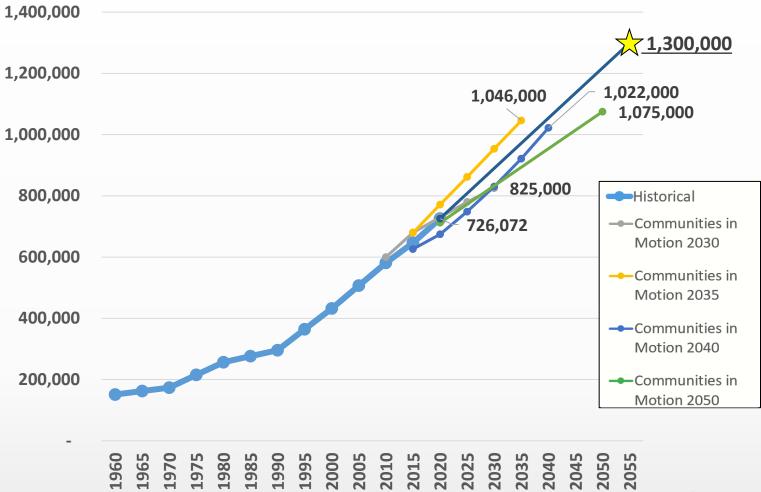
