- 6. Wait for the chair to take a vote. After discussion is complete, the chair will call for a vote.
- 7. Listen as the chair announces the result of the vote.

Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff requests that the COMPASS Board of Directors ratify Resolution 15-2022 (Attachment 1) to add seven new public transportation projects to the FY2022-2028 TIP. The Regional Transportation Advisory Committee recommended adoption of the resolution on April 27, 2022. The COMPASS Executive Committee adopted the resolution in its May 10, 2022, meeting.

Background/Summary:

The Idaho Transportation Department (ITD) requested to add six new rural public transportation projects that were selected through a recent application process for Federal Transit Administration funding. In addition, Valley Regional Transit (VRT) requested to add one bus replacement project awarded through a nationally competitive grant. A summary of each project is provided below, and details are provided in Attachment 1.

- Key Number 19883 Transit Fixed Line Service, Rural Areas, Treasure Valley Transit (TVT)
 - o Continues fixed line service in rural areas of southwest Idaho
 - \$4,182,000 over FY2023 and FY2024
- Key Number NEW2 Transit Operations, Kuna Senior Center
 - o Supplements operations costs for the Kuna Senior Center transportation program
 - \$61,000 over FY2023 and FY2024
- Key Number NEW3 Transit Preventative Maintenance, Kuna Senior Center
 - o Provides routine annual maintenance for the Kuna Senior Center bus
 - o \$6,000 in FY2023
- Key Number NEW4 Transit Purchase of Service, Rural Areas, VRT
 - Coordinates purchase of service to support trips with at least one leg in rural areas of Ada and Canyon Counties
 - \$124,000 over FY2023 and FY2024
- Key Number NEW5 Transit Vehicle Replacement, Ada County Highway District
 - o Replaces 12 Commuteride vans with 10-passenger hybrid minivans for use in rural areas of Ada and Canyon Counties
 - o \$663,000 over FY2023 and FY2024
- Key Number NEW6 Transit -Vehicle Replacements, TVT
 - Replaces three Americans with Disabilities Act-compliant conversion vans used in the southwest Idaho region
 - o \$263,000 over FY2023 and FY2024
- Key Number NEW7 Transit Vehicle Replacements, VRT
 - Replaces three compressed natural gas 25-foot cutaway buses with three 35-foot electric buses in the Boise Urbanized Area
 - o \$2,400,000 in FY2022
 - o Funds through a nationally competitive grant

The first six projects are set to begin in FY2023 but adding them to the program now allows the start of the projects early in the fiscal year. The last project (NEW7) is ready to obligate immediately upon approval.

A public comment period on the proposed amendment was held between March 31 and April 14, 2022. COMPASS received 13 comments. Staff does not recommend changes based on public comments received. Verbatim public comments are provided in Attachment 2.

Implication (policy and/or financial):

The amendment to the TIP ensures that the document continues to meet federal fiscal constraint requirements and enables work to begin as soon as possible on these projects.



Topic: Resolution Modifying the FY2022-2028 Regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff requests that the COMPASS Board of Directors ratify Resolution 17-2022 (attached) modifying the FY2022-2028 TIP to significantly increase the cost of one Ada County Highway District (ACHD) project and adjust the timing and decrease right-of-way costs of five ACHD projects. The COMPASS Executive Committee adopted the resolution in its June 7, 2022, meeting. Due to timing constraints, the Regional Transportation Advisory Committee did not review this item.

Background/Summary:

Since ACHD expanded its roadway maintenance projects to include all improvements needed to adjacent sidewalks and Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliant ramps, timing has been a concern. The Idaho Transportation Department is short-staffed, resulting in much longer wait times to obtain state and local agreements and necessary approvals. Due to these issues, ACHD staff requested to delay its roadway and ADA improvement projects by one or more years in the draft FY2023-2029 Regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP).

Shortly after ACHD made the request, its FY2022 roadway maintenance project (Key Number 19465) received its final engineer's estimate, which was double the expected cost. With this revelation, ACHD requested that the change to delay the projects be expedited to help cover the cost of the FY2022 project.

It is critical to be able to obligate funds immediately for the FY2022 project. The FY2022 project cannot be obligated without using the funds from the delay of the FY2023 project, which creates a domino effect of all other ACHD projects in the program. ACHD also requested to decrease the right-of-way costs of these projects based on recent estimates. These changes are described below.

- Pavement Preservation and ADA, Phase 1, Boise Area FY2022 (Key 19465)
 - o Increase construction cost \$7,729,000 (116.21%)
 - o Funds from delay of projects below, release of funds, and local funds
- Roadway and ADA Improvements Part 1, Boise Area FY2023 (Key 20259)
 - Decrease right-of-way cost by \$280,000
 - o Delay construction phase from FY2023 to FY2024
- Roadway and ADA Improvements, Boise Area FY2024 (Key 20674)
 - Decrease right-of-way cost by \$350,000 and delay from FY2023 to FY2024
 - Delay construction phase from FY2024 to FY2025
- Roadway and ADA Improvements, Boise Area FY2025 (Key 21896)
 - o Decrease right-of-way cost by \$400,000 and delay from FY2024 to FY2025
 - Delay construction phase from FY2025 to FY2026

- Roadway and ADA Improvements, Boise Area FY2026 (Key 22390)
 - o Decrease right-of-way cost by \$300,000 and delay from FY025 to FY2026
 - o Delay construction phase from FY2026 to Preliminary Development
- Roadway and ADA Improvements, Boise Area FY2027 (Key 22816)
 - Decrease right-of-way cost by \$400,000 and delay from FY2026 to Preliminary Development

The FY2022 apportionment included an increase of approximately \$1 million for the Surface Transportation Block Grant program in the Boise Urbanized Area based on the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, the new transportation authorization bill. COMPASS staff anticipates a similar increase throughout the remaining years of the program. This increase will more than cover the cost of the actions requested.


Implication (policy and/or financial):

The modification to the TIP will ensure that the document continues to meet federal fiscal constraint requirements, enable work to begin immediately on the FY2022 project, and enable additional time for the remaining projects to be able to deliver successfully in the future.

Topic: Revision 4 of the FY2022 Unified Planning Work Program and Budget

Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff seeks COMPASS Board of Directors' adoption of Resolution 18-2022 approving Revision 4 of the FY2022 Unified Planning Work Program and Budget (UPWP).

Background/Summary:

Federal metropolitan planning rules require that COMPASS produce a UPWP, which is periodically amended to accommodate changes in revenues, expenses, staffing, and scope. These amendments are usually accomplished through a Board resolution with subsequent distribution of the approved resolution and documents to the appropriate funding agencies.

The Finance Committee was scheduled to review the proposed revision to the FY2022 UPWP at its June 16, 2022, meeting; however, the meeting was cancelled due to lack of quorum. Therefore, the Finance Committee has not provided a recommendation on this item.

The following revisions to revenues are proposed in Revision 4 of the FY2022 UPWP:

 Add a total of \$313,873 of Consolidated Planning Grant funds for expenditure in fiscal year 2023. These are additional funds that were allocated through the recently passed Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act but were unknown to COMPASS staff until just recently.

The following revisions to expenses are proposed in Revision 4 of the FY2022 UPWP:

 Add \$313,873 to Direct Operations/Maintenance for expenditures that will be made in FY2023.

Implication (policy and/or financial):

Without COMPASS Board of Directors' adoption of Revision 4 of the FY2022 UPWP, the agency cannot make full use of available revenues.

Topic: Communities in Motion 2050 (CIM 2050) Project Priority Rankings and Unfunded Lists

Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff seeks COMPASS Board of Directors' approval of the CIM 2050 project priority rankings and unfunded lists (attached), as recommended by the Regional Transportation Advisory Committee (RTAC) on May 25, 2022.

Background/Summary:

The purpose of a long-range transportation plan is to anticipate, plan for, and fund transportation projects to meet current and future transportation needs. To that end, CIM 2050 will include multiple project lists:

- Short-term budgeted projects (approved by the COMPASS Board of Directors, April 18, 2022)
- Long-term funded projects (approved by the COMPASS Board of Directors, April 18, 2022)
- Prioritized state and local system roadway projects (funded and unfunded)
- Prioritized unfunded public transportation system projects
- Unfunded regional pathway priorities, roadway projects not included in the prioritized lists, and studies

The COMPASS Board of Directors approved the project scoring process for CIM 2050 on February 28, 2022. Roadway projects to be scored using that process were shared with the COMPASS Board in the same meeting.

The roadway prioritization process was applied to projects identified as "needed" by 2030 (Bin 1), a subset of projects from the approved long-term funded and draft unfunded roadway lists. Seventeen roadway projects were evaluated and scored using the regional travel demand model and the performance measure framework to analyze how each project impacts CIM 2050 goals and the transportation system, per the approved prioritization process.

Initial project rankings based on those scores were provided to RTAC on April 27, 2022, along with prioritized public transportation system improvements and lists of unfunded pathways, additional roadway projects, and studies. RTAC subsequently recommended the lists and priority rankings in its May 25, 2022, meeting.

Supporting summaries and score sheets for all projects included in Bin 1 were provided to RTAC to give additional information to further inform possible refinements to the initial rankings. No changes to the initial rankings were made by RTAC. The summaries and score sheets are available under "supplemental information" on the COMPASS Board webpage:
www.compassidaho.org/documents/people/board/2022/CIM2050_Priority_Corridor_ScoreSheets_Summaries.pdf.

Implication (policy and/or financial):

CIM 2050 must include existing and proposed transportation facilities that function as an integrated transportation system. The project priority rankings and unfunded lists help meet this requirement and provide the direction to continue funding the needed projects in the region. Staff anticipates that member agencies will apply for funding for projects identified as "needed" by 2030 (Bin 1) through future formula and/or competitive processes. The unfunded lists will also provide the direction for additional funding opportunities.







Topic: Communities in Motion 2050 Implementation Policies

Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff seeks COMPASS Board of Directors' approval of the *Communities in Motion 2050* implementation policies, as recommended by the Regional Transportation Advisory Committee on May 25, 2022.

Summary:

Communities in Motion 2050 addresses four goal areas and 18 objectives established by the COMPASS Board of Directors. A draft set of implementation policies (attached) have been developed to guide tasks and processes to achieve the goals and objectives. The draft implementation policies also reflect the focus areas of the federal transportation law, the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA).

COMPASS undergoes a federal Certification Review process every four years to evaluate the agency's practices and policies to ensure the agency is meeting all federal requirements, including those in the IIJA. COMPASS completed its most recent Certification Review on May 5, 2022, and results are anticipated later this summer.

Staff asks for latitude to edit or add implementation policies to address any recommendations or corrective actions stemming from the federal Certification Review that are not already included in the policies, if needed. Any changes will be brought to the COMPASS Board of Directors prior to plan adoption.

The approved policies will be incorporated into the *Communities in Motion 2050* plan.

Implication (policy and/or financial):

Regional policy statements guide the implementation of Communities in Motion 2050.

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Communities in Motion 2050 Implementation Policies

Regional policy statements help guide the implementation of *Communities in Motion 2050* (CIM 2050):

- Use anticipated available funding in Ada and Canyon Counties to strategically address regional priorities as identified in the regional long-range transportation plan as outlined in the <u>funding policy</u>;
- <u>Coordinate</u> local plans for land use and transportation investments to implement the CIM 2050 Vision and goals;
- Incorporate the <u>Congestion Management Process</u> in project prioritization and funding considerations and continue to collect data to help implement appropriate congestion mitigation measures;
- Consider the COMPASS <u>Complete Network Policy</u> in transportation planning and funding decisions to promote appropriate design of transportation facilities for the needs of all users;
- Integrate equitable and sustainable practices in transportation and land use planning and decision-making;
- Employ a <u>grant program</u> and seek additional funding through competitive funding sources to assist agencies in finding innovative ways to implement CIM 2050;
- <u>Educate and actively engage</u> the public and stakeholders on best practices for implementing CIM 2050;
- Monitor, track, and <u>report on development activity</u> and changes to comprehensive plans and other related documents; and
- Consider the CIM 2050 Vision and goals when developing projects and tasks for the annual COMPASS <u>Unified Planning Work Program</u>.

Topic: End-of-Year and Redistribution Program Priorities

Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff seeks COMPASS Board of Directors' approval of End-of-Year and Redistribution Program priorities, provided in Attachment 1. The Regional Transportation Advisory Committee recommended approval on May 25, 2022.

Background/Summary:

Federal highway funding not obligated within its program year must be returned to the Federal Highway Administration at the end of the fiscal year. To ensure Idaho does not have to return funding, the Idaho Transportation Department (ITD) develops an End-of-Year Program to reprogram unobligated funds to other projects in the state. Unobligated funds from other states redistributed to Idaho also provide funding for this program. ITD divides available funding from the End-of-Year and Redistribution Program based on Idaho Transportation Board Policy 4028:

- 12.6% of available funding provided to local agencies
 - Urban entities receive one-half of the local funding
 - Large Urban areas (the Boise Urbanized Area/Transportation Management Area [TMA]) receive one-half of the urban funds
 - Small Urban areas (including the Nampa Urbanized Area) receive one-half of the urban funds
 - o Rural entities receive one-half of the local funding

Metropolitan planning organizations submit local prioritized needs to ITD for inclusion in the End-of-Year and Redistribution Program, as funding becomes available. COMPASS staff keeps an ongoing list of needs and budgets additional funding as cost savings on other projects are realized. Any remaining needs, as well as opportunities to advance projects, are added to the End-of-Year and Redistribution Program priority list.

Projects receiving funding through the End-of-Year and Redistribution Program must be in the transportation improvement program and ready to obligate funds immediately. There is not enough time to transfer funds from the Federal Highway Administration to the Federal Transit Administration in this process; therefore, some public transportation projects are ineligible for these funds.

Priorities:

COMPASS staff recommends priorities for the End-of-Year and Redistribution Program based on the COMPASS Board Policy, *Balancing Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) and Transportation Alternative Program (TAP) Funds*, approved by the COMPASS Board of Directors on February 22, 2021, which includes the following priority criteria:

- 1. Obtain 100% of the estimated allocation (currently limited to 92.47%)
- 2. Cover cost overruns/project needs on projects obligated in a previous year or currently under contract
- 3. Advance the construction phase of projects
- 4. Cover cost overruns/project needs/advance right-of-way phase on projects in the STBG or TAP programs
- 5. Cover cost overruns/project needs/advance design phase on projects in the STBG or TAP programs
- 6. Cover cost overruns/project needs/advance planning projects in the STBG or TAP programs
- 7. Cover cost overruns/project needs/advance project phases in non-STBG or TAP programs
 - A. Construction
 - B. Right-of-Way
 - C. Design
 - D. Planning/Studies

End-of-Year and Redistribution Program funds are first made available to projects within each program. If there are not enough projects in the program ready for obligation, funds may become available for other programs. Cost increases are based on requests from member agencies, as described in their official requests in Attachment 2 (note that funds already shown as local to convert to federal do not require an official request).

The Balancing Policy for STBG-TMA, STBG-Urban, and TAP-TMA funds in its entirety is available online: www.compassidaho.org/documents/prodserv/trans/FY21/BalancingPolicy_FINAL_210222.pdf.

COMPASS staff will present needs in the Nampa Urbanized Area to the Urban Balancing Committee on July 7, 2022, for additional prioritization for the statewide STBG-Urban program.

Next Steps:

- July 7, 2021 Urban Balancing Committee determines priorities for small urban areas
- Mid-August 2022 Idaho Transportation Board approves priorities statewide
- Mid-September 2022 ITD staff notifies COMPASS of available funds and actions taken

Implication (policy and/or financial):

Approval of End-of-Year and Redistribution Program priorities by the COMPASS Board of Directors makes project needs eligible for obligation of funds if funding becomes available. COMPASS policy allows all actions related to approved priorities to occur via administrative modification, which will occur in September 2022.

Topic: Proposed High-Capacity Transit Planning and Environmental Linkages Study

Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff seeks COMPASS Board of Directors' direction on including a high-capacity transit Planning and Environmental Linkages (PEL) study in the draft FY2023-2029 Regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) by advancing the high-capacity transit planning project (Key No. 13046; currently in Preliminary Development in the FY2022-2028 TIP) and/or seeking competitive grant funding for the study. The Regional Transportation Advisory Committee recommended consideration of the PEL study in its March 30, 2022, meeting.

Background/Summary:

In June 2021, the COMPASS Board of Directors approved regional rail on the Boise Cutoff alignment as the "locally-favored" high-capacity transit option south of the Boise River for *Communities in Motion 2050.* A 2020 update to the <u>Treasure Valley High Capacity Transit Study</u> and feedback from three public surveys conducted between 2019 and 2021 informed this decision.

COMPASS proposes conducting a PEL study beginning in FY2024 as the next step in the planning process. The PEL would evaluate the feasibility of high-capacity transit options and document existing conditions, verify the future need, and demonstrate how that need could be met. A PEL process will provide a structured way to refine the analyses of previously studied modes and alignments and analyze regional rail on the Boise Cutoff alignment, which combines features from modes included in previous studies. The PEL would also bring key stakeholders, such as federal transportation and resource agencies, into the planning process and include public outreach.

Expected outcomes of the study include:

- A problem statement, outlining the purpose and need for high-capacity transit service south of the Boise River
- Updated and more refined analyses of alternatives and their feasibility as potential solutions
- Planning-level cost-estimates
- Stakeholder and public input
- Documentation of the process, data, and feasibility of high-capacity transit option(s)

Implication (policy and/or financial):

A PEL study would help refine the feasibility of regional high-capacity transit options and prepare the region to secure funding to advance high-capacity transit planning and design into the federal process.

Topic: Resolution Modifying the FY2022-2028 Regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff requests that the COMPASS Board of Directors adopt Resolution 19-2022 (attached), modifying the FY2022-2028 TIP to significantly increase the cost of two projects and decrease the cost of one project, as requested by the Idaho Transportation Department (ITD). The Regional Transportation Advisory Committee will be requested to recommend adoption of the resolution on June 22, 2022.

Background/Summary:

The ITD public transportation division requested a significant cost increase to one project included in Amendment #3 (approved by the Executive Committee in May), to award closer to the requested amount. The full year apportionment for FY2022, which resulted in greater funding availability, was released after the project funding level was recommended.

The ITD bonding division requested a significant cost increase to one project as well as the release of funds from one project in the COMPASS planning area.

These changes are described below.

- Key Number NEW04 Transit Purchase of Service, Rural Areas, Valley Regional Transit
 - o Increase of \$166,000 (133%)
 - o To increase award to better reflect funding request
- Key Number 20788 State Highway 16, Interstate 84 to US 20/26 and State Highway 44, Ada and Canyon Counties
 - o Decrease of \$25,000,000 (-17%)
- Key Number 23409 State Highway 16, Franklin Road to Ustick Road, Canyon County
 - o Increase of \$39,108,000 (112%)
 - o To cover final engineer's estimate and prepare project to go to bid
 - o Partially funded through the release of funds from Key Number 20788

Implication (policy and/or financial):

The modification to the TIP ensures that the document continues to meet federal fiscal constraint requirements and enables the release of funds on one project and work to begin as soon as funds are available on two projects.

Background/Summary:

The TIP is a short-term (five-to-seven year) budget of federally funded and regionally significant transportation projects in Ada and Canyon Counties. It is updated annually, with a public involvement period in the summer and approval by the COMPASS Board of Directors in the fall. In preparation for public comment on the draft FY2023-2029 TIP, the draft project list is attached for your review in three formats. The first two include all projects (new, existing, and changed), while the third lists major changes (as compared to the FY2022-2028 TIP) and new projects only. Please note that changes are still being made; the information provided is as of June 8, 2022.

- <u>Draft FY2023-2029 TIP Detailed Project List</u> provides funding details and a description of each project.
 - o Provided on the COMPASS website under "supplemental information" at https://www.compassidaho.org/documents/people/board/2022/220608DRAFT_23_29_TIP_Detail.pdf (92 pages).
- <u>Draft FY2023-2029 TIP Basic Project List (Attachment 1)</u> provides a summarized version of each project.
- <u>Major Changes List (Attachment 2)</u> provides a summary of new or removed projects, projects with advanced or delayed construction, and projects with major changes in scope, as compared to the FY2022-2028 TIP.
 - The Major Changes List will be updated in a red-line format and forwarded via email prior to public comment.
- <u>Acronym List</u> (Attachment 3) acronyms used in the project names to make them fit within available space.

In addition, COMPASS staff maintains summarized worksheets for balancing purposes for each of the following programs:

- Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) in the Boise and Nampa Urbanized Areas
- Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) in the Boise Urbanized Area
- Federal Transit Administration (FTA) programs in the Boise and Nampa Urbanized Areas

These worksheets are available upon request for a detailed programmatic review of projects.

Notes:

• Key numbers for new projects are temporary and start with the letters "ORN" (for Office of Transportation Investment reference number). Some ORN numbers are not yet available, and the key number may simply say "new" until an official number is assigned.

- Some projects use local agency key numbers, as they are locally funded and not included
 in the Idaho Transportation Department's tracking system but are regionally significant.
 These key numbers typically start with an alphabetical reference (e.g., RD2016-05).
- When construction for a project is beyond the first five years of the TIP, the year of construction is not always known. In those cases, you will see "PD" (for "preliminary development") instead of a specific project year. This serves as a placeholder until a project year is known.
- The "TIP Achievement" and "Regionally Significant" sections are not yet finalized.
- COMPASS staff is still developing maps and graphics.

The FY2023-2029 TIP will not be official until adopted by the COMPASS and Idaho Transportation Boards and approved by Federal Highway and Federal Transit Administrations. The current FY2022-2028 TIP will remain in effect until final approval of the FY2023-2029 TIP, which is anticipated by December 31, 2022.

Agencies with new projects or major changes to current projects in the FY2023-2029 TIP cannot act on those changes until federal approval of the FY2023-2029 TIP is obtained. However, an amendment to the FY2022-2028 TIP may be processed for actions that need to occur in the first quarter of FY2023, prior to federal approval.




