Communities in Motion 2040 2.0 Development Review

The Community Planning Association of Southwest Idaho (COMPASS) is the metropolitan planning organization (MPO) for Ada and Canyon Counties. COMPASS has developed this review as a tool for local governments to evaluate whether land developments are consistent with the goals of *Communities in Motion 2040 2.0* (CIM 2040), the regional long-range transportation plan for Ada and Canyon Counties. This checklist is not intended to be prescriptive, but rather a guidance document based on CIM 2040 2.0 goals.

Recommendations

Both Happy Valley Road and Amity Road are listed as priority, unfunded corridors in the *Communities in Motion* 2040 plan. Amity Road, from Southside Boulevard to McDermott Road, is planned to be widened to five lanes. It is the second highest-ranked local unfunded corridor. Happy Valley Road, from Greenhurst Road to Stamm Lane, is planned to be widened to five lanes. It is the #5 local priority. Nearby services, such as schools, parks, grocery, and other services are likely accessed only by vehicle and there are no plans for public transportation to this location. Consider providing an improved pathway along Indian Creek to comply with the Nampa 2019 Bike and Pedestrian Master Plan.
