






Despite Building Increases, Vacancy has Continued to Decline






Despite Building Increases, Prices Have Continued to Rise








Regional Population Growth is Strong






Population Growth for Larger Cities









Underproduction of Housing as of 2021











Summary of Key Findings



Supply and demand are imbalanced. Treasure Valley communities are growing FAST and in uncoordinated ways. Housing supply has not kept pace with demand.



Affordability is at risk. Every community has housing needs at every income level. Safe, healthy, and affordable housing is essential to community and household stability.



Every partner is needed. Every community has a role to play in meeting housing need at every income level.




Regional coordination is a missing piece. There are many ways to meet housing needs and regional coordination is needed.

Government Intervention Can Ease Development Barriers

Survey Respondents highlighted these barriers	and also highlighted these solutions	
Political support and leadership, public perception of affordable housing	Encourage political will and community support, increase the number of developers in the region	
Zoning and regulations make development difficult	Adjust zoning for higher density development, offer incentives	
Financing and funding for affordable and higher density development	Offer incentives, increase funding, change lending practices, use CDFIs	



- The Regional Housing Coordination Plan is an <u>initial phase of</u> work that:
 - Sets the foundation and understanding of how different actors in the region can encourage coordinated housing production
 - Is focused on building relationships, framing the conversation, and developing a shared understanding of issues and solutions
 - Offers COMPASS, local governments, housing developers, service providers, and other partners time and space to establish roles, responsibilities, and a shared vision for housing in the region
- The near-term strategies are for COMPASS to set the stage
- Subsequent strategies/plans can focus on jurisdictions with more influence over housing opportunities and production



5 Near-Term Strategies for COMPASS to Undertake



1) Continue convening the Workgroup



2) Identify ways to encourage growth where infrastructure exists



3) Adjust COMPASS's population forecast methods



4) Continue offering housing education and training opportunities



5) Advocate for state policy change to increase affordable housing gap funding





2020 Urban Area Boundaries, per the U.S. Census




Adjusted Urban Area Boundaries






3 Urban Areas, Less than 50,000 Population "Small"




1 Urban Area, Over 50,000 Less Than 200,000 Population "Large"





1 Urban Area, Over 200,000 Population "Transportation Management Area (TMA)"




2020 Urban Area Boundaries, per the U.S. Census



















Important things to remember

Purpose and Process

Purpose:

 To provide guidance and direction regarding the policy preferences and priorities of the COMPASS Board.

Process:

- Accelerated timeline
 - August Executive Committee Discussion
 - September Executive Committee Recommendation
 - October Board Approval



1. Transportation Revenue:

COMPASS supports continued investment in Idaho's state and local transportation systems...

2. Growth:

COMPASS supports policies that allow for growth to pay for growth...

3. State Transportation Policy:

COMPASS supports policies to augment state and local transportation entities' abilities to meet the transportation needs of the state and region...



Transportation Revenue:

Enhanced Transportation Revenues. COMPASS
 supports enhancing state transportation revenues in a
 stable and predictable fashion to address Idaho's longterm infrastructure funding needs, including but not
limited to local roadways, highways, public
transportation, active transportation, and child
pedestrian safety projects.



Growth:

- Property tax cap. COMPASS supports removing the property tax cap on local taxing districts to meet the increasing infrastructure needs associated with new development.
- Transportation impact fee flexibility. COMPASS
 supports expanding the statutorily allowable uses of
 transportation impact fees to include additional capital
 improvements such as sidewalks, bicycle lanes, and
 public transportation improvements.



State Transportation Policy:

- High occupancy vehicle (HOV) lanes. COMPASS supports changing existing statutory authority to allow HOV lanes to be considered by the Idaho Transportation Department (ITD) Director in any region in Idaho.
- Speed limits on state highways. COMPASS supports improved coordination and cooperation between ITD and local governments in establishing speed limits on state highways within local jurisdictional boundaries.
- Interstate passenger rail service. COMPASS supports the restoration of Amtrak passenger rail service in Idaho.
