Communities in Motion 2040 2.0 Development Review

COMPASS has developed this review as a tool for local governments to evaluate whether land developments are consistent with the goals of *Communities in Motion 2040 2.0* (CIM 2040), the regional long-range transportation plan for Ada and Canyon Counties. Recommendations

This proposal exceeds growth forecasted for this area. Transportation infrastructure may not be able to support the new transportation demands. The proposal is on the fringe of urban development in an area removed from employment centers and existing public transportation. ValleyConnect 2.0 proposes a bus route along Highway 44 connecting Canyon County to downtown Eagle and the Meridian Village.

The COMPASS Transportation Improvement Program identifies the widening of State Highway 44 (State Street) from Star Road to State Highway 16. An additional lane in both directions will help alleviate congestion issues and improve safety. Construction is anticipated in 2024 (Key #20574).
