Chair Lenny Riccio called the meeting to order at 8:33 a.m.

OPEN DISCUSSION/ANNOUNCEMENTS

Hunter Mulhall announced that he will share the technical document to outline the Congestion Management Process with RTAC in the coming days. This item will be brought to the February RTAC meeting for recommendation of approval by the Board of Directors at their February 28, 2022, meeting.

CONSENT AGENDA

A. Approve December 15, 2021, RTAC Meeting Minutes

Brent Moore moved and Nichoel Baird Spencer seconded approval of the Consent Agenda as presented. Motion passed unanimously.

ACTION ITEMS

A. Elect RTAC Chair and Vice Chair

Lenny Riccio facilitated the election of the 2022 RTAC Chair and Vice Chair.

After discussion, Lenny Riccio moved and Ryan Head seconded to nominate Brent Moore as 2022 RTAC Chair.

Clair Bowman moved and Nichoel Baird Spencer seconded a substitute motion to elect Brent Moore, Ada County, as 2022 RTAC Chair. Motion passed unanimously.

Lenny Riccio moved and Nichoel Baird Spencer seconded to elect Lee Belt, City of Greenleaf, as 2022 RTAC Vice Chair. Motion passed unanimously.

B. Recommend Communities in Motion 2050 (CIM 2050) Project Scoring Process

Toni Tisdale reviewed the CIM 2050 project scoring process.

After discussion, Clair Bowman moved and Stacey Yarrington seconded to recommend COMPASS Board of Directors' approval of the project scoring processes for CIM 2050, including updating the active transportation workgroup recommended process, as discussed. Motion passed unanimously. This item will be brought to the COMPASS Board of Directors for action in its February 28, 2022, meeting.

C. Recommend Resolutions Amending *Communities in Motion 2040 2.0* (CIM 2040 2.0) and the FY2022-2028 Regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

Toni Tisdale reviewed the resolutions amending CIM 2040 2.0 and the FY2022-2028 TIP and a Board Administrative Modification to approve large cost increases for three projects.

After discussion, Jace Hellman moved and Ryan Head seconded to recommend the COMPASS Board of Directors adopt resolutions amending CIM 2040 2.0 and the FY2022-2028 TIP, including a correction to Key Number 20549 from \$64,000 to \$72,000. Motion passed unanimously. This item will be brought to the COMPASS Board of Directors for action in its February 28, 2022, meeting.

D. Approve Transportation Management Area (TMA) Balancing Action

Toni Tisdale reviewed actions to balance the Surface Transportation Block Grant-TMA program to release funds from one project and apply the released funds to three projects.

After discussion, Ryan Head moved and Nichoel Baird Spencer seconded to approve the balancing actions for the STBG-TMA program, as presented. Motion passed unanimously.

INFORMATION ITEMS

A. Review Development of *Communities in Motion 2050* (CIM 2050)

Carl Miller reviewed work completed on CIM 2050 to date and outlined final steps to complete the draft plan for public comment in fall 2022 and Board of Directors' adoption in December 2022. This information will be shared with the COMPASS Board of Directors in its February 28, 2022, meeting.

B. Review *Communities in Motion 2050* (CIM 2050) Funded Projects and Unfunded Needs

Mary Ann Waldinger reviewed initial CIM 2050 long-term funded projects and unfunded needs, in preparation for project prioritization, pending Board of Directors' approval of the prioritization process, as recommended earlier in the meeting.

C. Review 2021 Updates to Communities in Motion 2040 2.0 (CIM 2040 2.0)

Liisa Itkonen reviewed 2021 factual updates of changes to costs and descriptions of funded projects in CIM 2040 2.0. This information will be shared with the COMPASS Board of Directors in its February 28, 2022, meeting and updated in the online plan.

D. Solicit Member Agencies' Requests for COMPASS' FY2023 Unified Planning Work Program and Budget (UPWP)

Liisa Itkonen announced the window for submitting requests for COMPASS staff time of five days or more for the FY2023 UPWP is open. Requests are due to COMPASS no later than February 16, 2022.

Topic: Federal-Aid Project Ranking

Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff seeks RTAC recommendation of the ranking of federal-aid projects.

Background/Summary:

Each year, COMPASS solicits funding applications for transportation needs through a two-phase approach. All applicants were required to submit a Phase I application; the deadline for Phase I applications for the FY2023-2029 funding cycle was December 6, 2021. COMPASS staff determined funding eligibility of all applications and provided information to applicants on December 16, 2021. Members who submitted applications deemed eligible for federal-aid funding were requested to submit Phase II applications, providing additional information for the federal process, no later than January 19, 2022.

All federal-aid-eligible applications, as well as a matrix including summary information, were available for review by RTAC voting members on February 4, 2022. COMPASS staff also hosted a voluntary workshop on February 2, 2022, to review each application and provide the opportunity for questions and discussion. The ranking process, using an online paired comparison method, was open between February 4 and February 16, 2022. The preliminary ranking from the paired comparison process will be posted no later than February 18, 2022, at this link: https://compassidaho.org/documents/people/rtac/2022/IVA PreliminaryFed-AidRanking.pdf

A total of 15 federal-aid eligible applications were submitted. Some applications are eligible for multiple funding sources. Applications were listed in each eligible funding category during the ranking process; therefore, some projects appear under more than one category in the attached preliminary ranking. Although guidance and funding levels for new programs (Carbon Reduction and Promoting Resilient Operations for Transformative, Efficient, and Cost-saving Transportation [PROTECT]) are not yet available, staff requests ranking to get programming started on these programs as soon as possible.

The number of applications submitted for each federal-aid funding program is listed below.

- Surface Transportation Block Grant Transportation Management Area (STBG-TMA) 9
- Transportation Alternatives Program TMA (TAP-TMA) 1
- Carbon Reduction TMA 5
- STBG-Urban (STP-U) 11
- Carbon Reduction U 4
- PROTECT U 1

COMPASS staff requests RTAC review of the preliminary rankings, discussion of possible changes, and a recommendation of the final rankings. The recommended rankings will guide staff in developing a funding plan for federal-aid programs. A summary of the federal-aid-eligible applications is provided in the attachment, for your convenience. The summary includes local agency priorities, meant to assist RTAC members in regional ranking.

<u>Timeline:</u>

The timeline for development of federal-aid programs is outlined below.

- March 2, 2022 RTAC optional workshop
 - o Review federal-aid funding recommendations
- March 16, 2022 RTAC recommends draft federal-aid programs, which feed into the draft FY2023-2029 Regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)
- **April 7, 2022** Urban Balancing (further balancing STP-U)
- May 25, 2022 RTAC reviews draft FY2023-2029 TIP
- June 27, 2022 COMPASS Board of Directors reviews draft FY2023-2029 TIP
- August 1-31, 2022 Public comment period on draft FY2023-2029 TIP
- September 28, 2022 RTAC requested to recommend FY2023-2029 TIP
- October 19, 2022 COMPASS Board of Directors requested to approve FY2023-2029
 TIP

COMPASS also has two non-federal programs, *Communities in Motion* Implementation Grants and the Project Development Program. The last opportunity to apply for funds through these programs is May 4, 2022. An optional workshop will be held to discuss applications on May 18, 2022. RTAC will be requested to rank applications for these programs May 13-25, 2022. The rankings for these programs will be provided to RTAC on July 27, 2022, for recommendation to the COMPASS Board of Directors on August 15, 2022.

Implication (policy and/or financial):

The ranking process develops the priority order to fund new projects in all available federal-aid funding programs managed by COMPASS.

Date: February 23, 2022

Topic: COMPASS Congestion Management Process (CMP)

Summary:

In 2005, COMPASS adopted the *Treasure Valley Congestion Management Systems Plan* (2005 CMP; linked below). The CMP outlines a methodology for producing up-to-date and accurate data on the state of traffic congestion in the region, identifies congestion management needs and strategies, and demonstrates how congestion is factored into the agency's long-range transportation plan and transportation improvement program (TIP). The most recent federal certification review of COMPASS cited the need to update the 2005 CMP with more current information regarding integration with the TIP and long-range plan, congestion management strategies, and performance measures. In 2019, COMPASS staff began updating the 2005 CMP to address the issues highlighted in the certification review and to reflect the most current information and polices.

In the December 2021 RTAC meeting, the components of the updated CMP were outlined and described. This information was also described in the draft updated CMP document that was emailed to RTAC for review and feedback on January 31, 2022, and is provided in "Supplemental Information" at

https://compassidaho.org/documents/people/rtac/2022/IVB_CMP_Technical_Document.pdf.

In the meeting, Hunter Mulhall will again review the highlights and expected outcomes of the updated CMP, discuss any feedback or comments received from members of RTAC, and seek RTAC's recommendation for COMPASS Board of Directors' acceptance of the updated CMP.

Topic: Transportation Management Area (TMA) Balancing

Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff seeks Regional Transportation Advisory Committee (RTAC) approval to balance the Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG)-TMA program to use funding released from a project entering close-out.

Background/Summary:

Balancing the STBG-TMA program allows funds released through a project entering close-out to be used for other projects with funding needs. The STBG-TMA program will have \$200,000 available for reprogramming with the release of funds.

COMPASS staff recommends programming available funds based on priorities outlined in Board Policy 2021-01, "Balancing Policy for the Surface Transportation Block Grant Program and Transportation Alternatives Program Funds," approved by the COMPASS Board of Directors on February 22, 2021. The policy is available on the COMPASS website: https://www.compassidaho.org/prodserv/resourcedev.html#TIP.

ACHD would like to release all remaining STBG-TMA funding from KN 20003, FY2019 Capital Maintenance, Phase 2 project. ACHD Construction Services staff have processed the final estimate at zero dollars and approved the release of \$200,000 of the remaining CN funding. Per the latest Program Summary report (attached) there is also a deficit of \$964.24 in the CE category that should be covered with \$1,000 in excess funding from either the CC or CN categories.

CN - \$215,000 - \$200,000 = \$15,000CE - \$964.24 + \$1,000 = \$35.76

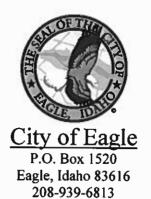

On behalf of the City of Eagle, I would like to request that Key#20841- Eagle Road Pedestrian and Bike Bridge be considered for additional funding for construction in Fiscal Year 2022. On October 12, 2021, the Eagle City Council voted unanimously to advance the construction of the Eagle Road Ped Bike Bridge from FY23 to FY22. Construction is anticipated to begin in Early 2023 and based on the results of the bid process complete by the end of the calendar year.

As you know, at the commencement of this project, it was estimated the project would be under \$2M to construct. The City at this point has a construction estimate of \$3.2M with over 1/3 of the cost being funded from local dollars. Through pathway impact fees and capital funds the City is in the position to advance the construction of the project but would like to request any additional balancing dollars that are available in FY22 to help off set the local burden and support advancing the construction.

This bridge project is local government investing in the increased modality and safety of SH-55. The bridge provides a dedicated pedestrian and bike option across the north channel of the Boise River along SH-55 (a 6 lane, 55-MPH, state highway) that was not provided by ITD when the bridge was constructed in 1999. ITD has no plans for expansion or for the provision of pedestrian and bike facilities on the existing bridge (or within the existing highway ROW). The nearest on-system crossings of the Boise River are Glenwood Street (SH-44) located 4-miles to the east or Linder Road (ACHD roadway) located 3-miles to the west. Increased federal funding will help off se the City's burden of improving safety on the state system. The project is programed to go out to bid the end of November with bid award in late December/Early January.

Summary: \$945,000 funded in FY2021

As the Regional Public Transportation Authority (RPTA) for Ada and Canyon counties, Valley Regional Transit (VRT) is responsible for developing a list of funded and unfunded public transportation capital needs in the region. The VRT Board of Directors adopted the Transit Asset Management (TAM) Plan in 2018. The plan requires an analytical process to prioritize all regional public transportation assets. VRT uses this prioritization process to improve and maintain all public transportation assets in a State of Good Repair (SGR). The following outlines the process for asset management and the findings of our current replacement and maintenance priorities for capital required to support existing services in the region.

VRT adopted a policy to establish the TAM target of 2.5 for most of the asset categories. VRT defines the assets below 2.5 as either delayed replacement or deferred maintenance. VRT completed an analysis to determine the level of investment required to replace all assets under the 2.5 score in a five-year replacement/improvement scale. VRT score assets and update the analysis each year.

VRT staff provided the details of the analysis to the Regional Technical Advisory Committee (RTAC) on June 26, 2019. The information provided in the packet outlined the details of the annual investment required to reach the five-year replacement/improvement goal. The total need to address the capital backlog for the region is \$35 million. VRT has federal funding to address the issues in the small urban area. VRT requires up to \$2 million annually in additional federal funding in the large urban area to meet the replacement goal.

Recommendation/Request:

Based on the average annual need, <u>VRT requests up to \$2 million each year</u> to address assets in the Boise system with scores between 0.0 through 2.5. VRT would fund projects identified in the Transit Asset Management Plan including rollingstock replacement, CNG fueling system improvements, and infrastructure improvements. In addition, the projects represented in these categories are "shovel ready" and can be selected and scaled based on the additional federal funding secured. The local match

has been identified and is currently being secured through VRT's annual budgeting process.

Implication (policy and/or financial):

Maintaining public transportation assets in a state of good repair is critical to ensure the continuity and cost effective delivery of regional public transportation services. The asset management system provides a data-drive approach to achieving priorities that ensure assets are replaced at the optimal time.

Topic: Communities in Motion 2050 (CIM 2050) Funded Projects and Unfunded Needs for "Bin 1" for Prioritization

Request/Recommendation:

Information/discussion. COMPASS staff will review the first group of the CIM 2050 needs for prioritization.

Background/Summary:

COMPASS staff have completed the initial step to identify transportation improvements needed to prepare for growth by the year 2050. The next step is to identify when projects are needed. These projects can come from any of the following three categories –

- Short-term funded (STF) represented in the Regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP).
- Long-term funded (LTF) assumed funded and complete within the horizon year of the plan (the "foundation," as approved by RTAC in December 2021).
- Long-term unfunded (UF) additional needed projects identified to accommodate forecasted growth as allocated in the CIM 2050 Vision.

The technical analysis and prioritization process will be corridor-based, encompassing multiple projects along a roadway. This allows for efficient and effective analyses and provides flexibility to implementing agencies. For example, if corridor "X" is ranked number one, then any project within that corridor could/should be next for budgeting. This provides the opportunity for agencies to get projects done under various scenarios – by a developer, along with utility improvements, public/private partnerships, etc.

Per the draft prioritization process and as presented in several previous RTAC meetings, "Bin 1" consists of identified needs by the year $\underline{2030}$. These are improvements needed to accommodate the growth anticipated over the next eight years. These should inform the budgeting process when applicable or be considered for competitive grant applications.

COMPASS staff will add each of the Bin 1 corridors, one at a time, and VRT's long-term funded system (not individual routes) per the draft Transit Development Plan, into the regional model, in the analysis year of 2030. The eight long-term unfunded corridors in Bin 1 will then be modeled a second time in the analysis year of 2050. This provides staff the information needed to fully evaluate, summarize, and score these unfunded corridors, as they are not part of the draft long-term funded list (i.e. CIM 2050 foundation).

The technical analysis will provide system-level summaries of vehicle miles of travel, vehicle hours of delay (travel), and congested vehicle miles of travel. In addition to the technical analysis, projects will also be scored based on the CIM 2050 goal areas (economic vitality, safety, convenience, and quality of life). COMPASS staff will develop a score sheet for each Bin 1 project that will include the technical and goal scores, as well as additional information, and compile a draft prioritized list based on the combined scores and other factors to bring to RTAC for review and feedback in April.

COMPASS staff recommendations for inclusion in Bin 1 technical analysis and prioritization, based on deficiency by 2030, are shown in Table 1.

Table 2 lists additional corridors needed by 2030. COMPASS staff will seek the implementing agencies' direction on whether or not to run these through additional analysis. Portions of these corridors are budgeted in the TIP and/or Ada County Highway District's (ACHD's) Integrated Five Year Work Plan (IFYWP) (noted as short-term funded [STF] in Table 2, below). ACHD completes its own prioritization process as part of its IFYWP process and Capital Improvement Plan. Additionally, the I-84 project listed last is undergoing an environmental study that will determine need; therefore, staff may not have enough information for the technical analysis at this time.
