Communities in Motion 2040 Development Review

The Community Planning Association of Southwest Idaho (COMPASS) is the metropolitan planning organization (MPO) for Ada and Canyon Counties. COMPASS has developed this review as a tool for local governments to evaluate whether land developments are consistent with the goals of *Communities in Motion 2040 (CIM 2040)*, the regional long-range transportation plan for Ada and Canyon Counties. This checklist is not intended to be prescriptive, but rather a guidance document based on CIM 2040 goals.

Recommendations

This proposal provides an opportunity for new development in the downtown of the City of Star. No site plan was provided, however, the proposal will likely request access to Highway 44, the #2 priority in the *Communities in Motion 2040* plan. Highway 44 is a critical corridor as it is a commuter route from several communities to downtown Boise and runs through several downtowns. Consider reducing vehicle access to Highway 44. Additional access locations can reduce efficiency on the corridor and reduce safety for bicyclists and pedestrians.

ValleyConnect 2.0 proposes increasing frequencies on the existing Highway 44 express bus route. Additionally, a new route would connect downtown Star to the Boise Towne Square Mall. Consider the needs of pedestrians who need to connect to the Life Springs Christian Church along State Street to and from the proposed site. Sidewalks on the north side of State Street as part of the Star Downtown Revitalization Plan should be considered now.

A project funded in the COMPASS Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) along State Street proposes widening from 2 to 5 lanes from Highway 16 to Star Road starting in 2018 and ending in 2022. In addition, maintenance work (seal coating) will take place in front of the proposed site in FY 2019.
