## Communities in Motion 2040 2.0 Development Review

The Community Planning Association of Southwest Idaho (COMPASS) is the metropolitan planning organization (MPO) for Ada and Canyon Counties. COMPASS has developed this review as a tool for local governments to evaluate whether land developments are consistent with the goals of *Communities in Motion 2040 2.0* (CIM 2040), the regional long-range transportation plan for Ada and Canyon Counties. This checklist is not intended to be prescriptive, but rather a guidance document based on CIM 2040 2.0 goals.

	Nearest bus stop: 0.2 miles Nearest public school: 1.2 miles Nearest public park: 1.3 miles Nearest grocery store: 2.5 miles	Residents who live or work less than ½ mile from critical services have more transportation choices. Walking and biking reduces congestion by taking cars off the road, while supporting a healthy and active lifestyle.

## Recommendations

The proposal would provide housing nearby employment centers and retail options, which can mitigate the increase of single occupancy vehicle trips generated on the transportation system and encourage non-motorized travel. The higher density is supportive of nearby future bus service. ValleyConnect 2.0 has identified this area as a development node that will connect to both local and regional transit services. Please reach out to Valley Regional Transit to determine what transit facilities would be most appropriately associated with this proposal. The proposal includes several pathways along Ten Mile Creek which are critical to provide a future, safe, accessible pedestrian option to Peregrine Elementary School and to transit.
