Liisa Itkonen presented Resolution 05-2019 approving *Communities in Motion 2040 2.0.*, the regional long-range transportation plan for Ada and Canyon Counties with the associated air quality demonstration for Northern Ada County.

After discussion, **Debbie Kling moved and Nathan Leigh seconded COMPASS Board of Directors**' adoption of Resolution 05-2019 adopting *Communities in Motion 2040 2.0* as the regional long-range transportation plan for Ada and Canyon Counties as presented. Motion passed.

# B. Approve Policy to Update Communities in Motion 2040 2.0

Liisa Itkonen presented COMPASS Board Policy 2019-01 for updating information in the online CIM 2040 2.0 document.

After discussion, Rebecca Arnold moved and Elaine Clegg seconded approval of COMPASS Board Policy 2019-01 with changes to language in the major changes to long-term funded and unfunded projects to read, "These changes will be added according to an approved Regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) amendment or TIP update and by the COMPASS Board of Directors' approval. All changes will be documented for the public and COMPASS Board." Motion passed unanimously.

# C. Adopt Resolution 06-2019 Amending the FY2019-2023 Regional Transportation Improvement Program

Toni Tisdale presented Resolution 06-2019 amending the FY2019-2023 Regional Transportation Improvement Program to add one project, advance and increase one project, decrease two projects, and increase seven projects.

After discussion, Garret Nancolas moved and Charlie Rountree seconded adoption of Resolution 06-2019 amending the FY2019-2023 Regional Transportation Improvement Program as presented. Motion passed unanimously.

# D. Approval 2019 Federal Transportation Policy Positions

Ken Burgess presented draft 2019 federal transportation policy positions recommended by the Executive Committee for COMPASS Board approval. Positions address reauthorization of the FAST Act, federal transportation funding, private investment incentives, streamlining the federal project delivery process, funding for public transportation, non-motorized transportation, the role of local governments, and rail corridor use.

After discussion, Elaine Clegg moved and Joe Stear seconded approval of the 2019 federal transportation policy positions as presented. Motion passed with 1 abstention.

# E. Approve 2019 Idaho Legislative Session Position Statements

Ken Burgess presented 2019 Idaho legislative session position statements recommended by the Executive Committee for COMPASS Board approval. Positions address transportation revenue, extension of "surplus eliminator" funding, local option sales tax authority, a funding mechanism for public transportation authorities, high occupancy vehicle lanes, and non-motorized transportation/Safe Routes to School.

After discussion, Elaine Clegg moved and Chad Bell seconded approval of the 2019 Idaho legislative session position statements as presented. Motion passed. Rebecca Arnold voted nay and there was 1 abstention.

# F. Adopt Resolution 07-2019 Approving Revision 1 of the FY2019 Unified Planning Work Program and Budget

Meg Larsen presented Revision 1 of the FY2019 Unified Planning Work Program and Budget as recommended by the Finance Committee for COMPASS Board approval.

After discussion, John Evans moved and Charlie Rountree seconded adoption of Resolution 07-2019 approving Revision 1 of the FY2019 Unified Planning Work Program and Budget as presented. Motion passed unanimously.

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### **Finance Committee**

ITEM IV-C

The purpose of the Finance Committee is to provide guidance to management and to establish reasonable, but not absolute, assurance regarding internal policies, procedures and controls for the sound operation of COMPASS.

The committee is composed of seven COMPASS Board members: the COMPASS Board Secretary-Treasurer, three members from Ada County and three members from Canyon County. The term of office for committee members are two-year staggered terms, except for the Secretary-Treasurer whose term is one year. There is no limit to the number of terms a member may serve. Terms are numbered except for the Secretary-Treasurer as odd-year/even-year terms.

# Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff seeks COMPASS Board of Directors' adoption of Resolution 08-2019 (attached) amending the FY2019-2023 TIP, as recommended by the Regional Transportation Advisory Committee on January 23, 2019.

# Background/Summary:

A summary of the action in the amendment is provided below; details are provided in the attachment.

Idaho Transportation Department (ITD) staff requested a significant increase to the construction cost of the State Highway 55, Snake River Bridge project near the City of Marsing to match the construction contract awarded in October 2018. The additional funding was obtained through statewide balancing. Construction is funded with state funding, scheduled over two fiscal years.

An amendment to address this increase was approved by the COMPASS Executive Committee on November 13, 2018, and ratified by the COMPASS Board of Directors on December 17, 2018. When processing the original amendment COMPASS staff received incorrect information. The construction amount is actually \$2.8 million more in FY2020 than shown in the original amendment, so a second amendment is needed to account for the full cost.

Public comment is not required for this action.

# Implication (policy and/or financial):

This amendment allows the project's construction costs to increase in order to be fully funded in FY2019 and FY2020 using state funds.

# Request/Recommendation:

Information/discussion.

# **Summary:**

The regional long-range transportation plan, *Communities in Motion* (CIM), is required to be updated in 2022. The four-year process to complete that update will begin in 2019. COMPASS staff will present a high-level overview of the proposed process (attached) for discussion and feedback. The proposed process was presented to the Regional Transportation Advisory Committee (RTAC) in its November 2018 meeting, and the first phase was discussed in the January 2019 RTAC meeting.

Per federal requirements, the horizon year of the next CIM update must extend to at least the year 2042 for a 20-year horizon. COMPASS staff recommends extending the horizon year to 2050 for this next update. That would provide for an almost 30-year planning horizon, with forecasted growth in 5-year increments.

Per federal requirements and the COMPASS certification review, major focus areas of the CIM update will include:

- a clear integration among the transportation modes in the regional transportation system
- the use of the congestion management process and congestion reduction measures, including transportation system management and operations, to address regional needs
- the inclusion of walking and biking as unique and separate modes
- a detailed look at transportation/land-use nexus, especially for providing transitsupportive infrastructure
- an analysis of long-term public transportation funding needed to support a significant mode shift
- the consequences of significant unfunded long-term needs, including impacts on transportation modes, employers and economic activity, and vulnerable populations

COMPASS staff will continue to work with RTAC on a draft scope of work and schedule throughout the spring. The draft scope of work will identify federally required elements, items needed to accomplish required elements, and items based on the federal certification review of the COMPASS program in September 2018. The draft scope and schedule will be presented to the COMPASS Board of Directors for discussion in its April 2019 meeting. RTAC will be asked to recommend Board approval of the draft scope in May 2019, and it is expected to come to the COMPASS Board of Directors for action in June 2019.

# Request/Recommendation:

# Background/Summary:

The TIP policies direct staff and RTAC on matters related to management and operations of programs within the TIP. Staff periodically reviews the policies and recommends changes to ensure they meet the needs of member agencies. At this time, COMPASS staff is recommending updates to three policies, as well as the addition of one new policy.

Two versions of each policy are provided in Attachments 1-3 – one "clean" version of the revised document and one version with changes tracked. Attachment 4 is a new policy, so there is not a corresponding "track changes" version. A brief summary of each policy and recommended significant changes follows (many minor changes are also included for correction or clarification):

    - COMPASS will follow the same program qualifications as the Federal Highway Administration for TAP funds allocated in the Boise Urbanized Area, with no additional limitations
    - Selection criteria includes a review of delivery and performance of past projects administered by the project sponsor and their ability to deliver a new project on time and on budget

The recommended policy updates will help ensure clarity and transparency in funding decisions regarding program amendment protocols, eligibility, project selection, and balancing priorities.

**Policy Statement:** 

Balancing Surface Transportation Program (STP) and Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) Funds

# **Background:**

STP and TAP funds are directly allocated to areas with populations over 200,000 (Transportation Management Areas [TMAs]). The Regional Transportation Advisory Committee (RTAC) is responsible for balancing the programs.

STP funds for areas 5,000 to 200,000 population are managed by the Idaho Transportation Department (ITD); however, the Urban Balancing Committee is responsible for balancing the program.

TAP funds for areas 5,000 to 200,000 population are managed by ITD and awarded through a competitive process. TAP funds managed by ITD are typically not allowed to change once a project is added to the program.

This policy provides direction to prioritize funds available through cost savings and through the End-of-Year Program and redistribution for current-year projects.

# Programming Available Funding in the Current Year and Transportation Improvement Program Update:

As funding needs are known, sponsors should submit requests to COMPASS staff to add the projects to COMPASS' lists of funding needs. COMPASS maintains two lists – one for projects funded with TMA funds, which is shared with RTAC, and one for projects funded with STP-Urban funds, which is shared with the Urban Balancing Committee.

The rational of these priorities is to target funds towards current construction, then use funds for design or right-of-way needs in an effort to minimize the delay of scheduled projects.

Projects currently funded in the STP and TAP programs are the top priorities for funds in order to fully develop and build projects in the programs. Project needs in other programs may be funded with STP and TAP funds if projects meet program eligibility and if no other projects are ready to use the funds within the programs at the appropriate time.

COMPASS staff will recommend funding actions for both the TMA and Urban programs, based on the following order of priorities for balancing:

- 1. Cover cost overruns/project needs in the construction phase for projects in the STP or TAP programs consistent with the original project scope
- 2. Remove or reduce an "advance construction" situation (where construction costs are spread over two or more funding years) on projects in the STP or TAP programs
- 3. Cover cost overruns/project needs or advance design or right-of-way phases on construction projects in the STP or TAP programs consistent with original project scope
- 4. Advance the construction phase on projects in the STP or TAP programs
- 5. Cover cost overruns/project needs or advance planning projects in the STP or TAP programs consistent with original project scope
- 6. Cover cost overruns/project needs in the construction phase on projects in non-STP or TAP programs consistent with original project scope
- 7. Cover non-construction cost overruns/project needs or advance design or right-of-way phases on construction projects in non-STP or TAP programs consistent with original project scope
- 8. Cover cost overruns/project needs or advance planning projects in non-STP or TAP programs consistent with original project scope
- 9. Add new projects as prioritized by the COMPASS Board of Directors
  - New projects should align with the goals, vision, and direction of the long-range transportation plan
  - Construction for new projects is typically added in preliminary development (PD). Other phases of the project (design and right-of-way) may be added in earlier years of the program, if funds are available
  - The limit for PD in STP-TMA is two times the projected funding allocation in the last year of the program
  - The limit for PD in STP-Urban is \$5,000,000 per metropolitan planning organization or the Local Highway Technical Assistance Council. Projects are added in coordination with the Urban Balancing Committee
    - The construction phase may not advance into a funded year until the concept report is approved by ITD

If there is a tie using the above prioritization criteria:

- RTAC will determine how the TMA programs will be balanced, without a recommendation from COMPASS staff
- The COMPASS Executive Director, in coordination with the Urban Balancing Committee, will determine how the Urban program will be balanced, after discussions with sponsor agencies involved in the tie

Capital improvements for alternative transportation, such as bus or van replacements, are considered "construction" projects.

STP and TAP programs should balance as close to 100% of the estimated allocation as possible.

# **Prioritizing End-of-Year and Redistribution Requests:**

Redistribution funds coming to the State of Idaho are allocated using ITD's formula and distributed to the appropriate programs.

End-of-Year funds are funds "swept" by ITD when projects were unable to obligate prior to deadlines – July 1 for design or right-of-way and August 1 for construction.

End-of-Year Program and redistribution funds are first made available to projects within each program. If there are not enough projects in the program ready for obligation, funds may become available for other programs.

The COMPASS Board of Directors approves the priority order of requests submitted for consideration of funding through the End-of-Year Program and redistribution, based on ITD's rationale of "construction first." The priority order is:

- 1. Obtain 100% of the estimated allocation
  - Congress historically limits obligation authority to 92%-97% of the estimated allocation
- 2. Cover cost overruns/project needs on projects obligated in a previous year or currently under contract
- 3. Advance the construction phase of projects
  - Projects must be ready for advertisement, including submittal of all agreements, and a check for local match, by August 1 of the programmed year
- 4. Cover cost overruns/project needs or advance design or right-of-way phases on construction projects
- 5. Cover cost overruns/projects needs or advance planning projects

Public transportation projects requiring funds to transfer to the Federal Transit Administration are not eligible for this program because the deadline for a transfer is June 1. The End-of-Year Program and redistribution occur in late August and early September.

# Adjustments within a project:

Sponsoring agencies may adjust funding among funding categories within a project budget in a fiscal year, if there is no net change to the funding total for the year of change.

The COMPASS Board of <u>Directors</u> approves the priority order of requests submitted for consideration of funding through the End-of-Year Program and redistribution, based on ITD's <u>philosophy</u> rationale of "construction first." The <u>priorities includepriority order is</u>:





**Topic: Extension of Delivery Deadlines for Local Federal-Aid Projects** 

#### Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff seeks COMPASS Board of Directors' approval to extend deadlines on local federal-aid projects. The Regional Transportation Advisory Committee (RTAC) recommended action for the Boise State University extension on January 23, 2019. Additional requests, submitted by the Ada County Highway District (ACHD), were received after the RTAC meeting, so have not been reviewed by the committee.

## Background/Summary:

The COMPASS Funding Application Guide FY2020-2024, approved on August 20, 2018, includes a deadline of March 1 for obligation of funds in programs managed by COMPASS. ITD has deadlines to "sweep," or remove, unobligated funds prior to the end of the fiscal year, and reprogram them to other projects that can obligate funds immediately. The March 1 deadline was established to allow time to reprogram the funds within the region if the sponsor is unable to obligate funds before ITD's sweep.

COMPASS received one extension request from Boise State University and three extension requests from ACHD (request letters attached):

## Bicycle Parking, Covered Bicycle Facility, Boise State University (Key Number 21913)

- Total project cost (FY2019) = \$30,000
- Funding source = Transportation Alternatives Program Transportation Management Area (TMA)
- Reason: Delay in project start
- Requested deadline for obligation: April 30, 2019
  - o Boise State University originally requested the extension through June 30, 2019. After discussion with University staff, it was clear they meant construction of the project could be complete by June 30, 2019, rather than the obligation of funds.

## Capital Maintenance, Phase 1, Boise Area – FY2019 (ACHD) (Key Number 13903)

- Total project cost = \$5,541,000
- Total construction cost (FY2019) = \$5,038,000
- Funding source = Surface Transportation Program (STP) TMA
- Reason: Delay in finalizing final documents
- Requested deadline for obligation: May 1, 2019

## Capital Maintenance, Phase 2, Boise Area – FY2019 (ACHD) (Key Number 20003)

- Total project cost = \$2,392,000
- Total construction cost (FY2019) = \$2,165,000
- Funding source = STP-TMA
- Reason: Delay in finalizing final documents
- Requested deadline for obligation: May 1, 2019

## Capital Maintenance, Phase 3, Boise Area – FY2019 (ACHD) (Key Number 20091)

- Total project cost = \$350,000
- Total construction cost (FY2019) = \$300,000
- Funding source = STP-TMA
- Reason: Delay in finalizing final documents
- Requested deadline for obligation: May 1, 2019

## Implication (policy and/or financial):

If projects are not delivered by the extended deadline, it could be too late to reprogram funds to another project, which could result in a loss of funding in the region.




Figure 1: Map of air quality monitoring locations, Ada and Canyon County




Figure 1: Map of air quality monitoring locations, Ada and Canyon County
