- 5. Respectfully debate your motion. As the person making the motion, you have the right to speak first, but do not have to. When you speak, state your opinion then respectfully listen to, and consider, other opinions.
- 6. Wait for the chair to take a vote. After discussion is complete, the chair will call for a vote.
- 7. Listen as the chair announces the result of the vote.

Chair-Elect Dave Case called the meeting to order at 1:42 p.m.

#### **OPEN DISCUSSION/ANNOUNCEMENTS**

Chair-Elect Case welcomed De Enrico, City of Wilder, to his first COMPASS Board meeting.

Matt Stoll noted the following changes to 2018 Executive Committee meetings: the January 9, 2018 meeting is cancelled and the February 13, 2018, meeting has been reschedule to February 6, 2018.

Amy Revis announced that the Idaho Transportation Board is proposing the I-84 corridor project to Caldwell be fully funded, and \$6 million in state funding be designated for preliminary design for the State Highway 16 corridor.

Matt Stoll explained the Idaho Transportation Board's funding proposal will go out for public comment, then brought to the COMPASS Regional Transportation Advisory Committee (RTAC) in January 2018. The RTAC recommendation will be presented to the COMPASS Board in its February 2018 meeting.

Jim Tibbs moved and Garret Nancolas seconded approval of the Consent Agenda as presented. Motion passed unanimously.

## INFORMATION/DISCUSSION ITEM

## A. Status Report - Finance Committee

Elaine Clegg, Finance Committee Chair, provided a status report on actions taken at the November 30 and December 14, 2017, Finance Committee meetings. Elaine noted at the December 14 meeting the FY2017 audit report was approved. COMPASS received "unqualified" or "clean" audit opinions on all three reports; financial statements, internal control over financial reporting, and on compliance and other matters. The auditor is confident that the financial statements are performed in accordance with the government auditing standards. The audit will be posted to the COMPASS website.

## **ACTION ITEMS**

## A. Adopt Resolution 04-2018 Amending the FY2018-2022 Regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

Toni Tisdale presented Resolution 04-2018 amending the FY2018-2022 TIP, to add an Intelligent Transportation Systems (ITS) project for the Ada County Highway District, remove an accessible vehicle project for Valley Regional Transit, and increase construction costs on a seal coat project for the Idaho Transportation Department.

After discussion, Charlie Rountree moved and Elaine Clegg seconded adoption of Resolution 04-2018 amending the FY2018-2022 Regional Transportation Improvement Program as presented. Motion passed unanimously.

## B. Approve Safety Targets

Carl Miller presented Idaho Transportation Department (ITD) safety targets to meet COMPASS' metropolitan planning organization safety target requirements. COMPASS does not have its own regional safety targets, but will work with ITD to support statewide safety efforts and targets.

# After discussion, **Elaine Clegg moved and Joe Stear seconded approval of the statewide safety targets as presented**. Motion passed unanimously.

## C. Approve 2018 Federal Transportation Policy Positions

Ken Burgess presented draft 2018 federal transportation policy positions recommended by the Executive Committee for COMPASS Board approval.

After discussion, **Garret Nancolas moved and Nathan Leigh seconded approval of the** 2018 federal transportation policy positions presented. Motion passed with 1 abstention.

B. Recommend 2018 Federal Transportation Policy Positions for COMPASS Board Approval

Matt Stoll presented 2018 federal transportation policy positions for COMPASS Board approval.

#### **REAUTHORIZATION OF FAST ACT**

#### Begin working TODAY on reauthorization

COMPASS appreciates Congress passed a longer-term (5-year) transportation authorization bill, but there is much work to do for the next authorization in FY2020.

#### FEDERAL TRANSPORTATION FUNDING

#### Stabilization of Federal Highway Trust Fund

COMPASS supports a permanent, long-term solution to funding the Federal Highway Trust Fund and discourages temporary infusions of general fund dollars.

#### Federal Fuel Tax

COMPASS supports an increase in the federal motor fuels tax and indexing the fuel tax rate to inflation.

#### Funding Diversification

COMPASS supports diversifying transportation user fee concepts to fund the Federal Highway Trust Fund.

**OTHER PROVISIONS** 

#### Expand Private Investment Incentives

COMPASS supports continued expansion of incentives for private investment in roadway, bridge, and alternative transportation infrastructure.

#### Public Transportation Programs

COMPASS supports increases in federal funding for public transportation.

#### Non-Motorized Transportation

COMPASS supports continued federal support for non-motorized transportation based on local needs or desires.

#### Topic: Communities in Motion 2040 Amendment

#### Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff seeks COMPASS Board of Directors' approval of Resolution 06-2018 (attached) amending *Communities in Motion 2040* (CIM 2040). The Regional Transportation Advisory Committee recommended approval of this amendment on January 24, 2018.

#### Background/Summary:

Long-range transportation plans, such as CIM 2040, can only include projects that have funding identified to pay for them. When funding is identified to pay for previously unfunded projects, the long-range transportation plan must be amended to add these projects. This proposed amendment includes adding three funded projects in CIM 2040, as requested by the Idaho Transportation Department and Valley Regional Transit, as described below. Full details of the proposed changes can be found at the end of the attached resolution. These changes constitute the fifth amendment to CIM 2040.

- The Idaho Transportation Department is proposing to add capacity and safety improvements on Interstate-84 from the City of Caldwell to the Karcher Interchange in the City of Nampa.
   Widening I-84 between the Cities of Nampa and Caldwell is the #1 unfunded priority in CIM 2040.
- The Idaho Transportation Department is proposing to add a project to begin preliminary engineering on the extension of State Highway 16 from Interstate 84 to US 20/26 (Chinden Boulevard). Extending State Highway 16 from I-84 to US 20/26 is the #14 unfunded priority in CIM 2040.
- Valley Regional Transit is proposing to add a project to begin design and environmental work on a transit oriented development in the City of Nampa. The project addresses part of CIM 2040 unfunded priority #11: valley**connect** near term improvements.

A public comment period on these proposed changes, as well as proposed changes to the FY2018-2022 Regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), was held January 9 through 23, 2018. In total, 544 comments were received; the majority of the comments were in favor of the proposed projects.

## **RESOLUTION NO. 06-2018**

## FOR THE PURPOSE OF AMENDING COMMUNITIES IN MOTION 2040

**WHEREAS**, the Community Planning Association of Southwest Idaho has been designated by the Governor of Idaho as the metropolitan planning organization responsible for transportation planning in Ada and Canyon Counties;

**WHEREAS**, the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act, Title 23 United States Code Section 134, and Title 49 United States Code Section 5303 requires metropolitan planning organizations to prepare regional long-range transportation plans covering a period of no less than 20 years;

**WHEREAS**, a public comment period was held between January 9 and January 23, 2018, and comments were shared with the COMPASS Board of Directors for consideration.

#### Changes Requested by the Idaho Transportation Department (ITD)

ITD is proposing to add two projects based on additional funding not anticipated in 2014.

The Idaho Transportation Board made a recommendation on December 14, 2017, to allocate the remainder of the GARVEE bonding authority and various sources of state and federal funds to continue safety and capacity improvements to the I-84 corridor between the Cities of Caldwell and Nampa. The scope of improvements between the Cities of Caldwell and Nampa and the improvements that may be needed in the City of Caldwell are not yet known; however, an ongoing study will determine the scope of the improvements. Widening I-84 between the Cities of Nampa and Caldwell is the #1 unfunded corridor in *Communities in Motion 2040*.

On December 14, 2017, the Idaho Transportation Board also made a recommendation to allocate \$6 million in state funds for preliminary engineering on the extension of State Highway 16 between I-84 and US 20/26. These funds will refine the scope, right-of-way needs, and cost estimate for the corridor. The remaining design, right-of-way acquisition, and construction are currently unfunded; previous estimates place construction costs at approximately \$400 million. Extending State Highway 16 from US 20/26 to Interstate 84 is the #14 unfunded corridor in *Communities in Motion 2040*.

## Change Requested by Valley Regional Transit (VRT)

VRT is proposing to add one project based on additional funding not anticipated in 2014.

VRT is working with the City of Nampa to develop a Transportation and Community Services Hub – Transit Oriented Development. The city requested federal-aid funding to begin design and environmental work on the project, which will use an existing building to create a central transportation and community services hub in an economically depressed area in the City of Nampa. The renovation of the facility will include an integrated system of "active transportation" improvements to help revitalize Nampa's adjacent neighborhoods and major activity center to drive the economic resurgence of the city and region. Construction is currently considered "unfunded," and will be added as funds become available. The project addresses part of *Communities in Motion 2040* unfunded priority #11: valley**connect** near term improvements.

## Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff seeks COMPASS Board of Directors' adoption of Resolution 07-2018 (Attachment 1) amending the FY2018-2022 Regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). The Regional Transportation Advisory Committee (RTAC) recommended approval on January 24, 2018.

## Background/Summary:

The Ada County Highway District (AHCD), Cities of Nampa and Middleton, Idaho Transportation Department (ITD), and Valley Regional Transit (VRT), requested changes to the FY2018-2022 TIP requiring COMPASS Board action. A summary of the actions in the amendment to the FY2018-2022 TIP are provided below; details are provided in Attachment 1.

The ACHD Commuteride program requested removal of additional vehicles to expand the Commuteride program. ACHD has determined additional Commuteride van routes are not needed in the Nampa Urbanized Area through FY2021. See ACHD's request in Attachment 2.

VRT, in coordination with the City of Nampa, designed improvements to the entrance and roundabout at the College of Western Idaho. The final engineer's estimate requires additional funding to complete the project. See VRT's request in Attachment 3.

VRT is also working with the City of Middleton on a park and ride lot and bus shelter at Piccadilly Park. The bid came in higher than the engineer's estimate. The city requested additional federal funds to complete construction. See VRT's request in Attachment 3.

VRT is working with the City of Nampa to develop a Transportation and Community Services Hub – Transit Oriented Development. The city requested federal-aid funding to begin design and environmental work on the project, which will use an existing building to create a central transportation and community services hub in an economically depressed area in the City of Nampa. The renovation of the facility will include an integrated system of "active transportation" improvements to help revitalize Nampa's adjacent neighborhoods and major activity center to drive the economic resurgence of the city and region. Construction is currently considered "unfunded," and will be added as funds become available. The project addresses part of *Communities in Motion 2040* (CIM 2040), the regional long-range transportation plan, unfunded priority #11: valley**connect** near term improvements. An amendment to CIM 2040 is also required to add this project. See VRT's request in Attachment 3.

VRT requested to remove a Safe Routes to School coordinator project in Canyon County for FY2018. The project is not eligible for the programmed funding source. The vendor, YMCA, had staffing turn-over throughout the year, and will be able to continue the program in FY2018 with existing funds, based on the program using fewer staff days than expected. See VRT's request in Attachment 3.

The Idaho Transportation Board made a recommendation on December 14, 2017, to allocate the remainder of the GARVEE bonding authority and various sources of state and federal funds to continue safety and capacity improvements to the I-84 corridor between the Cities of Caldwell and Nampa. The scope of improvements between the Cities of Caldwell and Nampa and improvements that may be needed in the City of Caldwell are not yet known; the ongoing study will determine the scope of the improvements. Extending State Highway 16 from US 20/26 to Interstate 84 is the #14 unfunded priority in CIM 2040. An amendment to CIM 2040 is also required to add this project.

A public comment period was held January 9 through 23, 2018. Verbatim comments are provided in Item VIII-A (CIM Amendment). No changes are recommended based on public comment.

## Implication (policy and/or financial):

This amendment makes the new and increased projects eligible for obligation of funds; and makes funds from the removed project available for other projects.

#### **Topic: Extension of Project Obligation Deadline**

#### Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff seeks COMPASS Board of Directors' approval to extend the March 1, 2018, deadline for project obligation for the State Street and Collister intersection project, as requested by the Ada County Highway District (ACHD). The details of the request are provided in Attachment 1 and described below. The Regional Transportation Advisory Committee did not review this request.

#### Background/Summary:

On August 17, 2015, the COMPASS Board of Directors approved a deadline of March 1 for obligation of funds in programs managed by COMPASS. ITD has deadlines to "sweep," or remove, unobligated funds prior to the end of the fiscal year, and reprogram them to other projects that can obligate funds immediately. The March 1 deadline was established to allow time to reprogram the funds within the region, if the sponsor is unable to obligate funds before ITD's sweep.

Extension request, per ACHD:

State Street and Collister Drive Intersection, Boise (Key Number 13481):

- Total construction funds = \$8,371,000
- Funding source = STP-TMA
- Reason: Delay in final approvals, as well as a funding shortfall of \$1,640,000 to cover the engineer's final cost estimate.
- New deadline for obligation: April 27, 2018

#### Implication (policy and/or financial):

If the project is not delivered by the extended deadline, it could be too late to reprogram funds to another project, which could result in a loss of funding lost funding in the region.

COMPASS staff seeks COMPASS Board of Directors' approval of the 2018 Resource Development Plan. The Regional Transportation Advisory Committee (RTAC) recommended approval on January 24, 2018.

#### Background/Summary:

The COMPASS Bylaws specify that one of the Board of Directors' primary responsibilities is to "[a]pprove the annual development plan which identifies: a) grants and other funding sources for COMPASS; and b) resource development activities which will be pursued by COMPASS staff."

On December 4, 2017, COMPASS staff received applications from COMPASS members seeking federal or COMPASS funding for projects. These applications form the basis for the Resource Development Plan, which guides staff resource development efforts throughout the year. To ensure the plan has the flexibility to allow staff to accommodate varied requests for resource development assistance, included in the plan are the major areas that will be the focus of transportation efforts by each member agency. The 2018 DRAFT Resource Development Plan can be found online at:

Based on funding source eligibility, projects listed in the plan are ranked through the paired comparison process, and only those ranked near the top are funded. Resource Development staff will focus their efforts for the coming year on all listed member projects that are NOT fully programmed for funding.

Staff efforts aimed at funding the remaining listed projects and other projects that fall within each member's focus areas include, but are not limited to:

- Finding and sharing grant opportunities
- Matching projects with funding sources
- Determining funding eligibility and interpreting guidelines
- Reviewing grants prepared by members prior to submittal
- Writing grants
- Managing grants
- Generating letters of support

### Implications (policy and/or financial):

This plan furthers the goals of *Communities in Motion 2040* by increasing opportunities for funding local projects within regional priorities.




Figure 1: Map of air quality monitoring locations, Ada and Canyon County




Figure 1: Map of air quality monitoring locations, Ada and Canyon County


