ACTION ITEMS

A. Review Economic Development District Proposal

Megan Larsen presented the draft Economic Development District (EDD) proposal for COMPASS to take over the Economic Development District function for Region 3 from the Idaho Council of Governments.

Jim Tibbs requested to invoke weighted voting. Dave Case and Megan Leatherman concurred.

After discussion, Sara Baker moved and Bob Henry seconded to approve the draft Economic Development District proposal as presented by staff and move forward with the next steps; Finance Committee to develop budget and membership dues.

Matt Stoll called role for a weighted vote. Motion passed 459,346 to 356,610 with 19,583 abstentions.

The spreadsheet used in the meeting in error was based on FY2014 dues.

Following the meeting, votes were verified based on FY2015 dues as reflected on the spreadsheet below. With the counts based on correct dues, the motion passed 459,049 to 356,799, with 20,064 abstentions.

Request/Recommendation:

Background/Summary:

Federal metropolitan planning rules require that COMPASS produce a Unified Planning Work Program and Budget (UPWP), which is periodically amended to accommodate changes in revenues, expenses, staffing, and scope. These amendments are accomplished through a Board resolution with subsequent distribution of the approved resolution and documents to the appropriate funding agencies.

Revision 3 of the FY2015 UPWP is proposed for the following reason:

To add \$225,000 of revenue and expense to reflect the award of "SHRP2" funds. The COMPASS Board approved a motion authorizing staff to apply for these funds at the January 26, 2015, Board meeting.

These funds will be used to collect more complete freight data and integrate freight considerations into the regional transportation system and long-range planning. The funds will also be used to develop a transparent and objective benefit-cost model, customizable for local conditions, for evaluating potential future transportation investments in relation to all *Communities in Motion 2040* elements.

The Finance Committee reviewed the proposed amendments and recommended approval of Revision 3 of the FY2015 UPWP as presented at its April 23, 2015, meeting.

Implication (policy and/or financial):

Without COMPASS Board adoption of Revision 3 of the FY2015 UPWP, the agency cannot make full use of available financial resources.

Topic: Approve Priorities for End-of-Year Program

Request/Recommendation:

Staff seeks Board approval of priorities for the End-of-Year Program. These priorities were recommended by the Regional Technical Advisory Committee (RTAC) on May 27, 2015.

Background/Summary:

Federal highway funding not obligated within its program year must be returned to the Federal Highway Administration at the end of the fiscal year. Therefore, the Idaho Transportation Department (ITD) develops an End-of-Year Program to ensure obligation of all available funds. Redistribution of funds from other states are also included in the End-of-Year Program.

ITD divides available funding based on Idaho Transportation Board policy:

- 12.6% of available funding provided to local agencies
 - o Urban entities receive one-half of the funding
 - Large Urban entities (Boise Urbanized Area) receives one-half
 - Small Urban entities receive one-half
 - o Rural entities receive one-half of the funding

It is common practice for Congress to limit available obligation authority. Currently, COMPASS has programmed 100% of the available budget (allocation), but we are limited to only 93.9% of the original allocation. The top priority for additional funds is to bring obligation authority up to 100% of what was expected, in order to cover the entire programmed amount.

Local agencies submit their prioritized needs to ITD to be included in the End-of-Year Program as funding is available. The proposed list of prioritized needs is provided as Attachment 1. COMPASS keeps ongoing lists of needs, and has programmed additional funding as there have been cost savings on other projects.

The TMA Balancing Committee made the recommendations for the TMA area needs on May 7, 2015. There are two remaining funding needs on the TMA needs list:

- Pathway, Garden City to Americana (Key Number 13514) is an advance construction project, meaning construction funds are spread over two years. The city requested assistance getting additional funds in FY2015 to reduce the hardship of fronting the FY2016 funds.
- Capital Maintenance, VRT FY2015 (KN 13510) is a transit need for up to three replacement buses in the Boise Urbanized Area. These funds would have to transfer from the Federal Highway Administration to the Federal Transit Administration. The committee was aware that ITD has a July 1, 2015, cut-off date for transfers, but wanted to include the need in case it could be done.

There are five projects in the Nampa Urbanized Area with known needs. Projects with expenses already incurred or those in the construction phase first are top priority.

- ITD's overflow report, reports projects with cost overruns in a specific phase of a project. Three projects in the Nampa Urbanized Area are listed on the overflow report:
 - o Amity Road, Chestnut Road to Robinson Road, Nampa (Key Number 10541)
 - o Intersection Karcher and Middleton Roads, Nampa (Key Number 12046)
 - South Cemetery Road, SH-44 to Willow Creek, Middleton (Key Number 12048)
- Two projects have been on the Urban Balancing Committee's needs list since summer 2014. Both of these projects have started design, and the contract was more than estimated.
 - o Middleton and Ustick Roundabout, Caldwell (Key Number 13487)
 - o Centennial Way Roundabout, Caldwell (Key Number 134848)

In June 2015, the urban needs will also be presented to the Urban Balancing Committee for additional prioritization statewide.

Implication (policy and/or financial):

Projects receiving funding through the End-of-Year Program must be in the Transportation Improvement Program and be ready to obligate funding immediately. If funding becomes available, recommended actions require approval via the administrative modification process, per COMPASS policy. Action would occur in August or September 2015.

The federally required Public Involvement Plan is included as Section II of the broader COMPASS *Integrated Communication Plan*. The COMPASS Public Participation Committee recommended Board approval at its April 7, 2015, meeting. Summary:

The COMPASS *Integrated Communication Plan* was developed to fulfill Objective 1.1 of the *COMPASS FY2015-2017 Strategic Plan* and to fulfill a corrective action from COMPASS' April 2014 federal certification review:

COMPASS FY2015-2017 Strategic Plan, Objective 1.1:

Develop an integrated communication plan, which will include public involvement, community collaboration, education opportunities, media relations, and marketing of the agency itself.

<u>Corrective Action, April 2014 COMPASS Transportation Planning Certification Review:</u>
The MPO needs to develop an overarching Public Participation Plan covering its entire planning program by August 2015.

The COMPASS Integrated Communication Plan describes all of COMPASS' communication programs – social media, education, crisis communications, and more. Section I introduces the plan, Section II is COMPASS' federally required Public Involvement Plan, and Section III describes the remainder of COMPASS' communication programs.

The Public Involvement Plan describes how the agency will engage the public in its planning processes. It is designed to assist COMPASS staff in planning public engagement efforts and to assist the public in understanding how they can be involved with COMPASS planning activities. This Public Involvement Plan will replace the current public involvement policy.

The COMPASS *Integrated Communication Plan* was released for a 45-day public comment period from April 17 – May 31, 2015. While the entire plan was available for comment, the comment period focused on the public involvement plan section. Twelve comments were received.

A description of the public comment process, a summary of comments received, and a description of changes made to the plan following public comment can be found in Appendix A of the draft document (see link above). Changes made to the plan following public comment are also shown in "track changes" in the body of the document. All open ended comments received can be found in Appendix B of the document.

Implication (policy and/or financial):

Approval of COMPASS *Integrated Communication Plan*, including the federally required Public Participation Plan, will allow COMPASS to meet strategic plan Objective 1.1 and comply with the federal corrective action.

Request/Recommendation:

Summary:

The COMPASS Board approved \$125,000 in FY2015 for the Project Development Program. The Program outcome is to transform project ideas into well-defined projects with cost estimates, purpose and need statements, environmental scans, and public information plans. Projects will be developed to ensure readiness for state and federal funding.

<u>Projects</u>. Ten applications were received and reviewed by COMPASS staff. Five projects were selected (highlighted below) and prioritized to move forward based upon completeness of application, readiness, and overall program balance (types, locations, and sizes of projects).

Topic: Communities in Motion (CIM) Implementation Grant Program Awards

Request/Recommendation:

Staff is seeking two actions from the COMPASS Board related to the CIM Implementation Grant Program. First, staff seeks approval of the FY2015 CIM Implementation Grants. The second request is for approval of the prioritized 2016 grant applications to be awarded upon approval of the FY2016 budget.

Summary:

The CIM Implementation Grant Program provides direct support to COMPASS member agencies in locally important projects consistent with regional goals in *Communities in Motion 2040*. Projects may be a plan, regulatory tool, construction, maintenance, concept/design, etc., and may be a stand-alone project or a phase/component of a larger project.

For FY2015, the COMPASS Board approved up to \$50,000 for the CIM Implementation Grant Program. The FY2016 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) and Budget requests \$75,000 for the program. To better align budgeting and construction schedules, COMPASS accepted applications in this cycle for both FY2015 and FY2016. RTAC made the following recommendations for FY2015 and FY2016 at their April 2015 meeting.

Topic: Amend FY2015-2019 Regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

Request/Recommendation:

Staff seeks Board adoption of Resolution 14-2015 (Attachment 1) amending the FY2015-2019 TIP by modifying the Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) – Statewide (also known as Community Choices Program). These actions were recommended for COMPASS Board adoption by the Regional Technical Advisory Committee (RTAC) on May 27, 2015.

Background/Summary:

ITD is amending procedures for the TAP-Statewide program. Originally, when current projects were in the application phase, ITD allowed local standards for design, similar to the previous Safe Routes to School program; therefore, many applicants did not apply for design funds. ITD has now learned the program must adhere to full federal standards, including design and environmental approvals. ITD is working with the Federal Highway Administration to streamline the design process. The update caused a delay in ITD processing State/Local Agreements resulting in projects being delayed.

Due to late starts and adjustments in design expectations, the Cities of Middleton and Caldwell requested removal of Community Choices projects and the City of Nampa requested to delay construction on one project.

- The City of Middleton requested removal of Pedestrian Improvements, North Middleton Road, Middleton (Key Number 14343) because design funds were not programmed for the project. This is a sidewalk project to fill a short gap, and the City plans to fund this project with local funds. The City requested the funds be moved to Pedestrian Improvements, Middleton Heights Elementary, Middleton (Key Number 18954) to help with the design costs and enable the project to be designed to federal standards.
- The City of Caldwell requested removal of Pedestrian Improvements, Lincoln Elementary, Caldwell (Key Number 19062) because design funds were not programmed for this project, that now requires design at federal standards. The City plans to fund this project with local funds. The funds will be returned to the TAP-Statewide program for reprograming by ITD at a later time.
- The City of Nampa requested to delay construction on Pedestrian Improvements,
 South Midland Boulevard, Nampa (Key Number 14344) from FY2015 to FY2017.

A public involvement period and amendment process are required, as projects are being removed from the Transportation Improvement Program or delaying the construction year. Public comment will be accepted May 29 through June 12, 2015. The delayed project does not require public comment, but staff kept all actions on the program together for transparency. Staff will provide a handout including all public comments at the Board meeting.

Implication (policy and/or financial):

The two projects being removed are expected to be completed in the future using local funds. Removal of these projects could result in a reduction of overall federal funding in the COMPASS Planning Area because funds will be reprogrammed within the TAP-Statewide program, balancing funding needs across the state.

Topic: Amend FY2015-2019 Regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

Request/Recommendation:

Staff seeks Board adoption of Resolution 15-2015 (Attachment 1) amending the FY2015-2019 TIP. This action is precipitated by ITD's intent to advance four ITD maintenance projects as well as converting the funds from federal to state sources. These actions were not taken to the Regional Technical Advisory Committee (RTAC) for recommendation due to timing constraints and late notification to COMPASS. ITD staff wants to get these projects under contract by mid-July 2015 to ensure obligation. Action by the COMPASS Board should occur prior to ITD obligation.

Background/Summary:

House Bill 312, passed last session (spring 2015), provides additional state funds to ITD for maintenance projects. ITD District 3 plans to advance the following projects, and convert the funding from federal to state sources. Costs are also adjusted to match the latest estimates. Details are provided as part of the resolution.

- SH-44, State Street to SH-55 North, Pavement Preservation, Eagle (Key Number 13923)
- I-84, Garrity Road Eastbound On-Ramp, Nampa (Key Number 13934)
- I-84, Ramp Pavement Improvements FY2016 (Key Number 13936)
- SH-19, Simplot Gate 6 to Blaine Street, Caldwell (Key Number 13937)

Construction of these projects will be funded with state funds in state fiscal year (SFY) 2016, which begins July 1st. However, the TIP is based on the federal fiscal year (FFY), which begins on October 1st. Because of the difference in the timing of the beginning of the fiscal years, and the fact that ITD wants to obligate funds in mid-July 2015, the projects will be shown in FFY2015, using SFY2016 funds.

No public involvement or air quality conformity adjustments are required for these actions. Information on these projects was sent to member agencies for review for any conflicts as soon as COMPASS was notified. No responses were received.

Implication (policy and/or financial):

This action converts projects from federal-aid projects to state-funded projects. However, design on all the projects was funded with federal funds; therefore, the projects are expected to proceed through the Federal Highway Administration as federal-aid projects. Availability of these additional funds and the advancement of the projects also creates room in later years of the STIP/TIP for additional projects.

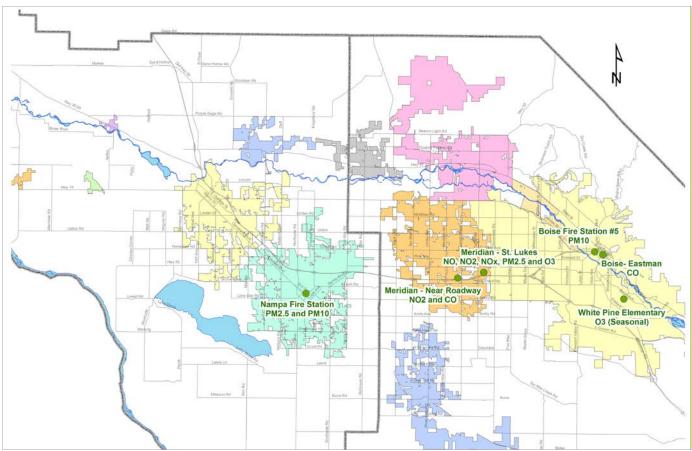


Figure 1: Map of air quality monitoring locations, Ada and Canyon County

Carbon Monoxide (CO)

A colorless, odorless, tasteless gas formed in large part by incomplete combustion of fuel. Human activities (i.e., transportation or industrial processes) are largely the source for CO contamination.

Oxides of nitrogen (NOx) Oxides of nitrogen; a precursor (building block) of ozone.

NOx is a generic term for mono-nitrogen oxides NO and NO₂ (nitric oxide and nitrogen dioxide).

They are produced from the reaction of nitrogen and oxygen gases in the air during

combustion, especially at high temperatures

Ozone (O3) A colorless gas with a sweet odor. Ground-level ozone is not a direct emission from

transportation sources. It is formed when volatile organic compounds, such as pesticides and solvents, and NOx combine in the presence of sunlight. Although the ozone in the upper atmosphere protects us from harmful ultraviolet rays, ground-level ozone is the main

component of smog.

PM2.5 Fine particulate matter, particles smaller than 2.5 microns in diameter, which are more likely to

lodge in human lungs than larger particles.

PM10 Course particulate matter, particles smaller than 10 microns in diameter, which are more likely

to lodge in human lungs than larger particles.

Topic: Report of Removed Projects

Request/Recommendation:

The Report of Removed Projects (Attachment 1) provides a summary of all federal-aid projects that were removed from the FY2015-2019 Regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) throughout the fiscal year. This is for information only.

Background/Summary:

When funding challenges arise, COMPASS staff works closely with sponsor agency staff, as well as with staff from the funding agency to determine a solution. When a workable solution is unattainable, the sponsor may request removal of the project from the federal program.

Projects removed from a program managed by agencies other than COMPASS (non-TMA funds), could result in funds being re-programmed in other parts of the state - outside the COMPASS Planning Area. Re-programming could result in reducing the amount of federal-aid coming into Ada and Canyon Counties.

Removal of a federal-aid project occurs only after public involvement and COMPASS Board approval.

Implication (policy and/or financial):

The report will provide background information for future funding decisions.
