- **5. Respectfully debate your motion.** As the person making the motion, you have the right to speak first, but do not have to. When you speak, state your opinion then respectfully listen to, and consider, other opinions.
- 6. Wait for the chair to take a vote. After discussion is complete, the chair will call for a vote.
- 7. Listen as the chair announces the result of the vote.

A. Status Report – State and Federal Legislative Activity Ken Burgess provided a status report on 2018 state legislative activity.

B. Status Report – Finance Committee

Garret Nancolas, Finance Committee Chair, provided a status report on action taken at the March 22, 2018, Finance Committee meeting.

ACTION ITEMS

A. Accept 2018 Population Estimates

Carl Miller presented the 2018 population estimates for Ada and Canyon Counties, which are used for local and regional planning and as a factor to help establish COMPASS membership dues, and recommended for COMPASS Board acceptance by the Demographic Advisory Workgroup.

After discussion, Jim Tibbs moved and Tom Dale seconded to accept the 2018 population estimates as presented. Motion passed unanimously.

B. Approve FY2019 General and Special Member Dues

Megan Larsen presented FY2019 General and Special member dues based on the 2018 population estimates and recommended for COMPASS Board approval by the Finance Committee.

After discussion, Darin Taylor moved and Charlie Rountree seconded approval of the FY2019 General and Special member dues as recommended by the Finance Committee. Motion passed unanimously.

C. Approve *Communities in Motion 2040 2.0* (CIM 2040 2.0) Short-Term and Long-Term Funded Transportation Projects

Liisa Itkonen presented *Communities in Motion 2040 2.0* short-term and long-term funded regional capital projects, as recommended by the Regional Transportation Advisory Committee for COMPASS Board approval. Liisa requested that approval also allow staff to update the project information, if needed, such as removing projects completed this year from the list and to bring any changes as information to the COMPASS Board on August 20, 2018.

After discussion, **Tom Dale moved and Jay Gibbons seconded approval of the** *Communities in Motion 2040 2.0* short-term and long-term funded regional captial projects as presented. Motion passed. Rebecca Arnold, Elaine Clegg, and Karen Gallagher voted nay.

D. Approve Prioritization of *Communities in Motion 2040 2.0* (CIM 2040 2.0) Unfunded Transportation Projects

Liisa Itkonen presented prioritized lists of unfunded transportation needs to be included in CIM 2040 2.0.; divided into three categories: regional state roadway system, regional local roadway system, and regional public transportation, as recommended by the Regional Transportation Advisory Committee for COMPASS Board approval.

After discussion, Paul Woods moved and Stan Ridgeway seconded approval of the *Communities in Motion 2040 2.0* unfunded regional state system corridors and projects, with the request that in future additions, the cleanup of the interchange at Beacon Light Road be addressed. Motion passed. Rebecca Arnold, Elaine Clegg, Karen Gallagher, and Jay Gibbons voted nay.

After discussion, **Darin Taylor moved and Elaine Clegg seconded approval of** the *Communities in Motion 2040 2.0* unfunded regional local system corridors and projects as presented. Motion passed unanimously.

After discussion, **Elaine Clegg moved and Brent Orton seconded approval of the** *Communities in Motion 2040 2.0* unfunded regional public transportation system projects as prioritized.

After discussion, **Darin Taylor moved a substitute motion and Tom Dale seconded** approval of the *Communities in Motion 2040 2.0* unfunded regional public transportation system projects by reversing the priority order of No. 3 - Boise Downtown Circulator and No. 4 - ValleyConnect 2.0 Growth.

Topic: FY2018-2022 Regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Amendment

Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff seeks COMPASS Board of Directors' adoption of Resolution 09-2018 (Attachment 1) amending the FY2018-2022 Regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). The Regional Transportation Advisory Committee (RTAC) recommended adoption of the resolution on May 23, 2018.

Background/Summary:

A summary of the actions in the amendment to the FY2018-2022 TIP is provided below; details are provided in Attachment 1 and letters requesting these changes are provided in Attachment 2.

The City of Caldwell requests to delay the **10th Avenue Bridge** project **(Key Number 13055)**. The final engineer's estimate was \$1,046,000 more than the amount programmed. The Local Highway Technical Assistance Council proposes to delay the project to FY2019, when they will be able to increase federal-aid funding. Funds will come from balancing in the FY2019-2023 TIP update process.

Valley Regional Transit requests to decrease federal funds by \$195,000 for the **Safe Routes to School (SR2S)** project **(Key Number 13909)**. Funds are passed through to the YMCA, who is not using the funds as quickly as projected due to staff turnover. There are no changes to the overall program.

The City of Eagle requests \$3,000 in federal funds for the **Pathway**, **Dry Creek Trail and Underpass** project **(Key Number 13916)**. The bid came in higher than the amount programmed. Currently the funds are shown as local, as the previous request for \$190,000 in federal-aid was partially funded, so local funds were used to cover the remainder. This action would convert local funds to federal-aid.

Boise State University requests to increase construction funds by \$36,500 on a **Bicycle Parking Facility** project **(Key Number 20095)**. The project was advanced to FY2018 in December 2017, but the requested increase was unavailable. Funding is requested to increase the number of facilities included in the project. By purchasing two smaller units, rather than one large unit as originally planned, more coverage in secured and covered parking will be available in multiple locations. Boise State University also requests the COMPASS Board of Directors' approval to delay obligation of this project, as unforeseen environmental work was required by the Idaho Transportation Department. Boise State University staff expects to complete the additional work by June 29, 2018. The City of Boise requests to advance design from FY2019 to FY2018 for their **Fairview Avenue Ramp** project **(Key Number 20639)**. This will allow an early start on design work. Construction is also anticipated to advance from FY2021 to FY2020 in the FY2019-2023 TIP.

The City of Eagle applied for a new project for the Draft FY2019-2023 TIP for a **Bicycle and Pedestrian Bridge over the North Channel of the Boise River** (Key Number NEW). Funds are available in FY2018, and RTAC recommended to add this project in FY2018 to allow the City of Eagle to begin design work early.

A public comment period to add the bicycle and pedestrian bridge in the City of Eagle was held May 14 through May 28, 2018. Verbatim comments are provided in Attachment 3. COMPASS staff does not recommend changes based on public comment received.

Implication (policy and/or financial):

These actions allow approved projects to proceed for de-obligation or obligation of funding and full obligation of the Transportation Management Area program funds in FY2018. All projects recommended for FY2018 funds must be able to obligate funds immediately.

WHEREAS, the Community Planning Association of Southwest Idaho desires to take timely action to ensure the availability of federal funds;

WHEREAS, the Community Planning Association of Southwest Idaho developed this amendment to the FY2018-2022 Regional Transportation Improvement Program in compliance with all applicable state and federal regulations; and

WHEREAS, the attached table details the amendment to the FY2018-2022 Regional Transportation Improvement Program.

NOW, **THEREFORE**, **BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Community Planning Association of Southwest Idaho Board of Directors approves the amendment to the FY2018-2022 Regional Transportation Improvement Program.

Due to the delay of Meridian's Rail with Trail Pathway, the City of Boise understands there is an opportunity to move other projects up in the Transportation Alternatives Program-Transportation Management Area (TAP-TMA) program.

The City of Boise submits this letter to confirm the understanding that the city's Fairview Ave Greenbelt Ramp project (KN20639) can be accelerated such that design and environmental analyses will occur in 2018 and construction will occur 2019. We appreciate Toni Tisdale's efforts to work with the city in advancing this important project to provide multi-modal connectivity to the west downtown Boise area.

The original cost estimate for this project was developed for COMPASS' phase II funding application in late 2016 using the most up-to-date construction cost and the conceptual design information available at that time. Since that original funding request, construction costs have escalated significantly and new information related to the federal aid design process has been made available to the city. In addition, the city has refined its original conceptual design with a higher level of detail, which has resulted in larger construction quantities of some materials, including concrete pavement and retaining wall. As such, additional budget will be required to ensure successful project delivery.

Based on recent City of Boise's Greenbelt construction bid results, updated unit cost information from our local highway jurisdictions, improved quantity estimates, expected construction cost escalation between now and 2019 and our improved understanding of the federal aid design process, we have updated our estimate and request the following funds:

- Additional federal aid funding requested for environmental/design in 2018: **\$25,200**
- Additional federal aid funding requested for construction in 2019: \$77,600
- Total additional federal aid funding requested: \$102,800

Topic: End-of-Year Program and Redistribution Priorities

Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff seeks COMPASS Board of Directors' approval of End-of-Year Program and redistribution priorities, provided in Attachment 1. The Regional Transportation Advisory Committee (RTAC) recommended approval on May 23, 2018.

Background/Summary:

Federal highway funding not obligated within its program year must be returned to the Federal Highway Administration at the end of the fiscal year. The Idaho Transportation Department (ITD) develops an End-of-Year Program to ensure obligation of all available funds within programs statewide. Redistribution of unobligated funds from other states is also included in the End-of-Year Program. ITD divides available funding from redistribution based on Idaho Transportation Board Policy 4028:

- 12.6% of available funding provided to local agencies
 - Urban entities receive one-half of the local funding (6.3% of the total)
 - Large Urban areas (the Boise Urbanized Area) receives one-half of the urban funds (3.15% of the total)
 - Small Urban areas (including the Nampa Urbanized Area) receives one-half of the urban funds (3.15% of the total)
 - Rural entities receive one-half of the local funding (6.3% of the total)

Metropolitan planning organizations submit local prioritized needs to ITD for inclusion in the Endof-Year Program for funding, as funds become available. COMPASS staff keeps an ongoing list of needs and programs additional funding as cost savings on other projects are realized. Remaining needs are added to the End-of-Year Program priority list. Lists of need for the recommended End-of-Year Program priorities are provided in Attachment 2. The sponsor requests are provided in Attachment 3. The ACHD request to convert design funds from local funds to federal-aid for the capital maintenance project in FY2020 was made verbally at the RTAC meeting and included in the motion to recommend the priorities. ACHD did not submit a letter for this request.

Projects receiving funding through the End-of-Year Program and redistribution must already be in the Transportation Improvement Program and ready to obligate funding immediately.

Priorities:

Priorities are recommended based on the Balancing Policy for Surface Transportation Program and Transportation Alternative Program funds, approved by the COMPASS Board on June 20, 2016, and available on the COMPASS website: http://www.compassidaho.org/prodserv/transimprovement.htm

COMPASS staff will present needs in the Nampa Urbanized Area to the Urban Balancing Committee on June 28, 2018, for additional prioritization statewide.

Next Steps:

- June 28, 2018 Urban Balancing Committee determines priorities for small urban areas
- August 15/16, 2018 Idaho Transportation Board approves priorities statewide
- Mid-September 2018 ITD staff will notify COMPASS of available funds and actions taken

Implication (policy and/or financial):

Approval of End-of-Year Program and redistribution priorities by the COMPASS Board of Directors make these projects eligible for obligation of funds, if funding becomes available. COMPASS policy allows all actions to occur via administrative modification, which would occur in September 2018.

ACHD requests an extension of the COMPASS Board's obligation deadline for KN 13481, State Street and Collister Drive Intersection project. The language for the project's State and Local Agreement is currently being edited by ACHD and ITD staff after a very fruitful staff discussion of the issues involved. The two agencies are completing the draft of procedural language that will cover the approximately \$1.3 million of required ACHD funds in excess of the required match. The City of Nampa completed PS&E for this project in 2016. At the time, it was programmed in PD at \$729,000 in the TIP. Nampa paid 100% of design costs and is committed to pay all utilities (estimated at \$60,000). Programmed funds come from local and STP-U funds.

The final cost estimate in the PS&E package added nearly \$200,000 to the estimated construction cost. Additional funds are still needed for CE (\$61,000) and CC (\$46,000). The City of Nampa would like to have you explore adding an additional \$307,000 to the project via the Urban Balancing process, if you are able. This amount includes both STP-U funds and Nampa's local match.

Topic: Federal BUILD Grant Application for US 20/26 Funding

Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff seeks COMPASS Board of Directors' approval for COMPASS to apply for federal Better Utilizing Investments to Leverage Development (BUILD) transportation discretionary grant funding, in partnership with the Idaho Transportation Department (ITD). BUILD funds replaced TIGER funds in the FY2018 federal appropriations act.

Background/Summary:

The FY2018 appropriations act appropriated \$1.5 billion to be awarded by the US Department of Transportation for the BUILD transportation program. FY2018 BUILD grants are for capital investments in surface transportation infrastructure and are awarded on a nationwide competitive basis for projects that will have a significant local or regional impact. Up to \$25 million is available for each project.

ITD requested COMPASS assistance to seek BUILD funding to construct a six-lane divided highway facility with separated multi-use pathways and multiple intersection improvements on US 20/26 from Smeed Parkway to Middleton Road in the City of Caldwell. The project would also include additional lanes on and between the I-84 off-ramp and Aviation Way. A multi-year Environmental Assessment was recently completed for this project and resulted in a Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI).

The amount requested would be up to \$25 million, which requires a minimum 20% match. ITD has committed to provide the required matching funds; however, additional funding partners would make the application more competitive, so efforts are underway to seek additional matching funds and/or letters of support from those who will directly benefit from this project.

COMPASS Resource Development staff would assist ITD with the preparation of the BUILD grant application. COMPASS would submit the joint application as the applicant; ITD would administer the grant if/when awarded.

Implications (policy and/or financial):

A successful application would address a portion of the number two priority in Ada and Canyon Counties for unfunded projects on the state system, as prioritized by the COMPASS Board of Directors on April 16, 2018 for *Communities in Motion 2040 2.0*.

Public Transportation

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Transportation Funding Terms and Acronyms... Unraveling the Jargon

Every profession has its own acronyms and jargon. The "shorthand" wording makes it easier and quicker for professionals in any given field to communicate with each other. However, that same shorthand leaves everyone else searching for an interpreter.

The following pages contain definitions of terms and acronyms related to transportation funding commonly found in the Regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). The list below provides definitions of some common terms and concepts included in the TIP. On the following pages, you will find an alphabetical list of funding terms as shown in the "Funding Source" section of each project description in the TIP. Definitions of additional transportation and planning terms can be found in the COMPASS glossary at www.compassidaho.org/comm/glossary.htm.

CFI	Continuous flow intersection; a type of intersection where vehicles attempting to turn cross the opposing direction of traffic before they enter the intersection
COMPASS/CPA	Community Planning Association of Southwest Idaho
HD	Highway district
Federal funding	Transportation funding collected by the federal government, then distributed to the states for use on both state and local transportation projects. The main purpose of the TIP is to budget federal funding.
Federal Highway Administration (FHWA)	An agency within the US Department of Transportation (DOT) that provides financial and technical assistance to state and local governments for the construction, maintenance, and preservation of the nation's highways, bridges, and tunnels.
Federal Transit Administration (FTA)	An agency within the US Department of Transportation (DOT) that provides financial and technical assistance to local public transportation systems.
FY	Fiscal year (refers to the federal fiscal year, which runs October 1 – September 30).
GARVEE	Grant Anticipation Revenue Vehicle (bonds).
I-84	Interstate 84.
Idaho Transportation Department (ITD)	The state agency responsible for state and national highways in Idaho, such as Interstate 84, US 20/26, and State Highway 55. ITD receives state and federal funding for transportation projects, primarily from state and federal fuel taxes and state registration fees.
ITS	Intelligent transportation systems; advanced technologies to improve the efficiency and safety of transportation systems.
Key number (KN)	A unique identification number assigned to each project in the TIP.
Local funding	Funding collected by local agencies, such as Ada County Highway District, for use on local projects.
Local match	The portion of a primarily federally funded project paid for with state or local funds. While match is required for most federally funded projects, the minimum required amount varies based on the type of funding.




Figure 1: Map of air quality monitoring locations, Ada and Canyon County




Figure 1: Map of air quality monitoring locations, Ada and Canyon County
