Topic: Communities in Motion 2040 (CIM 2040) and FY2017-2021 Regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)

Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff seeks confirmation of Resolution 13-2017 (attachment 1) amending CIM 2040 and Resolution 14-2017 (attachment 2) amending the FY2017-2021 TIP to add an environmental study on I-84. The TIP amendment also includes increasing development costs on a project in the City of Caldwell with funds available through redistribution. This item was not presented to the Regional Transportation Advisory Committee (RTAC) due to time limitations. Both resolutions were adopted by the COMPASS Executive Committee on September 12, 2017.

Background/Summary:

In August 2017, the Idaho Transportation Board voted to use up to \$1 million to begin an environmental study and traffic analysis on Interstate 84 from the Karcher Road interchange in the City of Nampa to the City of Caldwell. Construction on this segment would still be considered "unfunded," but completion of the environmental study will allow ITD and COMPASS to apply for construction funding in the future. For the project to move forward, *Communities in Motion 2040* must first be amended, followed by an amendment to the FY2017-2021 TIP.

The project in the City of Caldwell received an increase in funding of more than 30%, requiring an amendment. This project is managed by the Local Highway Technical Assistance Council (LHTAC). The increase was made possible through the redistribution process, but was not on the COMPASS End-of-Year and redistribution priority list because it is funded through an LHTAC program.

Public comment to add the environmental study on I-84 was accepted August 27 through September 11, 2017. Public comments were accepted on changes to the draft FY2018-2022 TIP at the same time. Verbatim comments are provided in Attachment 3; only one comment (letter from Canyon Highway District #4) addressed the proposed environmental study.

Implication (policy and/or financial):

These amendments made the projects eligible for obligation of funds.

RESOLUTION NO. 13-2017

FOR THE PURPOSE OF AMENDING COMMUNITIES IN MOTION 2040

WHEREAS, the Community Planning Association of Southwest Idaho has been designated by the Governor of Idaho as the metropolitan planning organization responsible for transportation planning in Ada and Canyon Counties;

WHEREAS, the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act, Title 23 United States Code Section 134, and Title 49 United States Code Section 5303 requires metropolitan planning organizations to prepare regional long-range transportation plans covering a period of no less than 20 years;

WHEREAS, the Idaho Transportation Department requested amendment to *Communities in Motion 2040* to add an environmental study on Interstate 84 between the City of Caldwell and the Karcher Road Interchange;

WHEREAS, the FAST Act, Title 23 United States Code Section 134, and Title 49 United States Code Section 5303 require projects contained in the regional long-range transportation plan to be financially constrained;

WHEREAS, the Idaho Transportation Department has funds available for the projects;

Dear Toni,

Please accept this feedback on ITD's proposed changes to the TIP:

- It appears that the proposed changes represent a net loss of transportation funding to the COMPASS area. I would prefer expenditure neutral TIP changes within the county, or at least within the COMPASS area.
- Key NEW, I-84 Karcher Road Interchange to City of Caldwell
 - Our agency is supportive of adding the project to the TIP.
- Key 19111, US 20/26 & Franklin Road Intersection Improvements
 - The highlighted comment indicates that "some improvements" will be salvaged from this deleted project and added to the scope of Key 19415; improved radii for right turns. Based on the crash data, Franklin Road ranks among the highest intersections and segments in the county worthy of attention. Per the recent public hearing for the US 20/26 corridor study, ITD representatives indicated that a signalized intersection would not only provide protected turning moves at this specific location, but also benefit the corridor at large through platooning between Star and Middleton roads to increase safer turn opportunities within the 6 mile corridor segment. It would be a shame to defer these site and systemic benefits as the needs for better safety and mobility exist today.
 - As such, our agency is opposed to this change.
- Key 18779, SH55 Intersection Improvements
 - The highlighted comment indicates that the elimination of the project will prevent adding unjustified right turn lanes. It was our understanding that the project scope also included left turn lanes as well, or that slight changes in scope would not routine. While the crash data available do not show a relative glut of crashes at these locations

relative to other intersections and segments within the County and COMPASS area, it is very obvious by the plethora of skid marks at Riverside that some form of dedicated left and right turn lanes is warranted at this intersection. With the year around landfill traffic and considerable recreation traffic to the wildlife refuge at Riverside, it makes good sense to salvage at least that element of the project. Sacrificing the proposed changes at Pride (good sight distance, low volumes) and Hoskins (poor WB sight distance) in favor or other high priority intersection or safety projects is a reasonable measure. Not so for Riverside; at the very least this project site needs to be retained in the project scope and the project left in the TIP.

- Our agency supports a reduction in scope to include improvements at Riverside, but does not support deletion of the entire project.
- Key 19415, US 20/26 Intersection Improvements
 - The highlighted comment indicates that only modest and relatively low return on investment improvements will be made at Northside and Franklin. Based on the crash data, Franklin Road is among the highest intersections and segments for crashes, and clearly worthy of attention. Northside is arguably less so. Likewise, Midland isn't near the top of crash locations on US 20/26. However, Midland has the highest AADT north of US 20/26 in the county other than Middleton Road, and with the new Suncor gravel operation coming to that route, truck traffic will exacerbate the challenging turning and crossing opportunities from Midland. Six Mile Engineering has provided a Traffic Impact Analysis that shows an additional 316 trips per day for the new gravel operation. They also conclude that a WB right turn lane is already warranted, LOS will drop to D during the peak hour for turning traffic, and the WB to NB turns will require widening.
 - Clearly, there is some value in keeping to the original scope for all 4 intersections, but if sacrifices have to be made, our preference would be to retain all of the intersection improvements at Midland and retain the revised project in the TIP.

- 5. City of Parma: Valley Road, McConnell Avenue to Walker Road crack seal

The official recommendation of the Rural Prioritization Workgroup includes signatures from a representative of each rural jurisdiction in support of the recommended project priorities, and is included as an attachment to the resolution.

Implication (policy and/or financial):

COMPASS Board of Directors approval of these priorities provides the regional support needed to help make these applications successful.

Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff seeks COMPASS Board of Directors adoption of Resolution 02-2018 (attached) amending *Communities in Motion 2040* (CIM 2040). The Regional Transportation Advisory Committee recommended approval of this amendment on September 27, 2017.

Background/Summary:

Long-range transportation plans, such as CIM 2040, can only include projects that have funding identified to pay for them. Unfunded regional needs may be shown in the plan, but must be clearly identified as "unfunded," and are not considered part of the planned transportation system until funding is identified. When there are changes to funded projects, or changes to the scope of funded projects, the long-range transportation plan must be amended to reflect these changes. This proposed amendment includes adding, removing, and/or changing the scope of several funded projects in CIM 2040, as requested by the Ada County Highway District, Idaho Transportation Department, and Valley Regional Transit, as described below. Full details of the proposed changes can be found at the end of the attached resolution. These changes constitute the fourth amendment to CIM 2040.

- Ada County Highway District's long-term funded projects in CIM 2040 were based on its 2012 Capital Improvements Plan – a 20-year plan of infrastructure improvements throughout Ada County. This plan was updated in 2016. As part of that update, some projects were removed and others were added or changed.
- The Idaho Transportation Department is proposing to add several projects based on additional funding not anticipated in 2014, as well as remove one project from the funded project list.
- Valley Regional Transit is proposing to design and construct a park and ride lot and bus shelter in the City of Middleton, based on funding that was not anticipated in 2014.

A public comment period on the amendment to CIM 2040, as well as the draft FY2018-FY2022 Regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), Valley Regional Transit's FY2018 proposed federal Program of Projects, and the required air quality conformity demonstration for Northern Ada County was held from July 17 to August 15, 2017.

In total, 57 comments were received, 28 related to the proposed CIM 2040 amendment. Support for proposed widening of US 20/26 (Chinden Boulevard) received the most comments.

Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff seeks COMPASS Board of Directors approval of a proposed CIM 2040 2.0 funding policy:

Use federal funds to maintain the existing transportation system and to strategically address regional priorities as identified in the regional long-range transportation plan.

The Regional Transportation Advisory Committee recommended approval on September 27, 2017.

Background/Summary:

The current funding policy in CIM 2040 directs "federal funds to be focused on maintenance of the existing transportation system." This statement originated from a project prioritization process discussion in 2012, and was confirmed by the COMPASS Board as the funding policy for the regional long-range transportation plan in 2013.

The current funding policy creates a problem when we obtain new federal funding sources that can and are used for capacity projects, including GARVEE funds. The proposed new policy confirms the importance of maintaining the existing transportation system, and also allows federal funding to be used to address regional priorities as identified in the regional long-range transportation plan. The strategic use of funds encourages the region to pursue the "biggest bang for the buck" depending on funding source and type of project.

Additional guidance for funding allocation will be documented in the Board-approved *Funding Application Guide*, which will be updated in spring/summer 2018.

Implication (policy and/or financial):

The CIM 2040 2.0 funding policy will guide how federal funds will be allocated through CIM 2040 2.0.

Topic: FY2018-2022 Regional Transportation Improvement Program and Associated Air Quality Conformity Demonstration

Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff seeks COMPASS Board of Directors adoption of Resolution 03-2018 (attachment 1) approving the FY2018-2022 Regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) (project list) and associated air quality conformity demonstration for Northern Ada County. The Regional Transportation Advisory Committee recommended approval on September 27, 2017.

Background/Summary:

The TIP is updated annually. There are many changes this year due to new funding strategies at the Idaho Transportation Department (ITD) and new funding opportunities provided by the Idaho Legislature. The "Major Changes List" (attachment 2) provides a summary of new or removed projects, projects with advanced or delayed construction, and projects with major scope changes, compared to the FY2017-2021 TIP. The proposed project list conforms to air quality budgets approved for Northern Ada County.

A public comment period on the draft FY2018-FY2022 TIP, as well as amendments to *Communities in Motion 2040*, Valley Regional Transit's FY2018 proposed federal Program of Projects, and the required air quality conformity demonstration for Northern Ada County was held from July 17 to August 15, 2017. In total, 57 comments were received, 34 of which were related to the draft FY2018-2022 TIP and 7 to the air quality conformity demonstration.

A second public comment period to include significant changes to three projects at the request of ITD, as well as an amendment to *Communities in Motion 2040* and the FY2017-2021 TIP, was held August 27 through September 11, 2017. Seven comments were received, all of which are related to the draft FY2018-2022 TIP.

ITD held a separate public comment period for the statewide Idaho Transportation Investment Program from July 1 through July 30, 2017. A total of 346 comments were received regarding proposed projects in the COMPASS planning area.

No changes are recommended by staff based on public comment.

WHEREAS, a public comment period was held between July 17 and August 15, 2017, for people to review and comment on proposed projects in the program;

WHEREAS, a second public comment period was held between August 27 and September 11, 2017, to address significant changes proposed after the initial comment period;

WHEREAS, the Community Planning Association of Southwest Idaho desires to take timely action to ensure the availability of federal funds; and

WHEREAS, the Community Planning Association of Southwest Idaho has developed the FY2018-2022 Regional Transportation Improvement Program for Ada and Canyon Counties, and corresponding air quality conformity demonstration for Northern Ada County, in compliance with all applicable state and federal regulations.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Community Planning Association of Southwest Idaho Board of Directors approves the Final FY2018-2022 Regional Transportation Improvement Program and the associated air quality conformity demonstration.

Topic: Rails with Trails

Request/Recommendation:

COMPASS staff will provide an overview of the Rails with Trails Workgroup and its planning work to date.

Background/Summary:

The Union Pacific rail corridor stretches 35 miles from South 1st Street in Nampa to the Boise City limits just south of Gowen Road. With 385,000 residents living within one mile of this corridor, it provides an ideal potential location for a rail with trail pathway. COMPASS established a Rails with Trails Workgroup in 2016 to develop a unified strategy among member agencies for the development of a continuous rails with trails system within the Union Pacific corridor to be included in *Communities in Motion 2040 2.0*.

Completed work:

Tasks completed by the Rails with Trails Workgroup to date include researching best practices with regards to liability, safety, maintenance, and design details. The workgroup has also identified right-of-way corridor conditions, constraints, and valuation methodologies, and has established planning level cost estimates for trail construction and right of way purchases.

Regional Transportation Advisory Committee (RTAC) feedback:

RTAC discussed rails with trails at its September meeting and re-emphasized the need for all relevant agencies to participate in the Rails with Trails Workgroup.

To be completed:

Additional tasks to be completed include public outreach, establishing wayfinding strategies, assessing environmental conditions, researching easements and property owners, establishing project timelines, and developing strategies to engage Union Pacific.

August Air Quality Monitoring:

The Idaho Department of Environmental Quality reported eighteen days in the moderate air quality category, ten days in the unhealthy for sensitive group category and one day in the unhealthy category in the Treasure Valley during the month of August 2017.




Figure 1: Map of air quality monitoring locations, Ada and Canyon County

Carbon Monoxide (CO)A colorless, odorless, tasteless gas formed in large part by incomplete combustion of fuel.
Human activities (i.e., transportation or industrial processes) are largely the source for CO contamination.

Oxides of Oxides of nitrogen; a precursor (building block) of ozone.

NOx is a generic term for mono-nitrogen oxides NO and NO₂ (nitric oxide and nitrogen dioxide). They are produced from the reaction of nitrogen and oxygen gases in the air during combustion, especially at high temperatures

Ozone (O3)

A colorless gas with a sweet odor. Ground-level ozone is not a direct emission from transportation sources. It is formed when volatile organic compounds, such as pesticides and solvents, and NOx combine in the presence of sunlight. Although the ozone in the upper atmosphere protects us from harmful ultraviolet rays, ground-level ozone is the main component of smog.

PM2.5 Fine particulate matter, particles smaller than 2.5 microns in diameter, which are more likely to lodge in human lungs than larger particles.

Course particulate matter, particles smaller than 10 microns in diameter, which are more likely to lodge in human lungs than larger particles.

- One day in the moderate category was attributable to fine particulate matter ($PM_{2.5}$) and ozone (O_3) recorded in Ada County
- Two days in the unhealthy for sensitive groups category were attributable to fine particulate matter (PM_{2.5}) recorded in both counties
- ullet Two days in the unhealthy for sensitive groups category were attributable to ozone (O₃) in Ada County
- Three days in the unhealthy category were attributable to fine particulate matter (PM_{2.5}) recorded in both counties
- One day in the unhealthy category was attributable to ozone (O₃) in Ada County




Figure 1: Map of air quality monitoring locations, Ada and Canyon County

NOx is a generic term for mono-nitrogen oxides NO and NO₂ (nitric oxide and nitrogen dioxide). They are produced from the reaction of nitrogen and oxygen gases in the air during combustion, especially at high temperatures

Ozone (O3)

A colorless gas with a sweet odor. Ground-level ozone is not a direct emission from transportation sources. It is formed when volatile organic compounds, such as pesticides and solvents, and NOx combine in the presence of sunlight. Although the ozone in the upper atmosphere protects us from harmful ultraviolet rays, ground-level ozone is the main component of smog.

PM2.5 Fine particulate matter, particles smaller than 2.5 microns in diameter, which are more likely to lodge in human lungs than larger particles.

PM10 Course particulate matter, particles smaller than 10 microns in diameter, which are more likely to lodge in human lungs than larger particles.

At the June 2017 Community Planning Association of Southwest Idaho (COMPASS) Board of Directors' meeting, the COMPASS Board amended *Communities in Motion 2040* (the regional long-range transportation plan for Ada and Canyon Counties) and the *FY2017-2021 Regional Transportation Improvement Program* to move a portion of Interstate 84 (I-84) in Canyon County from the unfunded priority list to funded within *Communities in Motion 2040*. This action allows the Idaho Transportation Department to initiate the necessary work to widen and improve I-84 from Franklin Boulevard interchange to the Karcher Road (Midland Boulevard) interchange in Nampa as prioritized by the Idaho Transportation Board at its April 2017 meeting.

The COMPASS Board is very appreciative of the approval of GARVEE bonding authority by the 2017 Idaho Legislature and the priority of the ITD Board to accomplish this portion of the critically needed I-84 improvements from Franklin Boulevard interchange in Nampa to Centennial Way interchange in Caldwell. There is no doubt that motorist safety, freight movement, and the overall economy of the region and the state will improve significantly with the completion of this critical corridor in Canyon County.

Communities in Motion 2040 identifies the transportation improvements needed in the region over the next 25 years. The corridors are selected and prioritized based on technical analyses of comprehensive plans within the region, projected population growth, existing and projected deficiencies on the region's transportation systems, and other variables. Those corridors are identified in the long-range plan in two forms – those with identifiable funding sources, and those without an identifiable funding source.

The COMPASS Board of Directors prioritizes in rank-order those corridors in which no funding source has been identified. The prioritized list is enclosed for your information and can also be found in Chapter 6 in *Communities in Motion 2040*. At the COMPASS Board of Directors' June 2017 meeting, we discussed the possibility of re-prioritizing this unfunded corridor list particularly with regard to the GARVEE-eligible State Highway 16 (SH-16) corridor from US 20/26 (Chinden Boulevard) to I-84. After some discussion, the COMPASS Board of Directors voted unanimously to confirm that the prioritized unfunded corridor list remains unchanged.

It is important to note that of the 32 corridors/projects on this unfunded priority list, the top 4 corridors are state highway corridors. In fact, our technical analyses show that for SH-16 corridor from US 20/26 to I-84 to optimally function when the region's population exceeds 1 million people, it is critical for the existing deficiencies on I-84 in Canyon County, State Highway 44 (SH-44)/State Street, and US 20/26 (Chinden Boulevard) need to be addressed before the new corridor is built.

We very much appreciate the work the Idaho Transportation Board and staff do to keep Idaho's transportation infrastructure in good working order. Thank you again for your efforts on the I-84 GARVEE project. We look forward to continuing a productive partnership with you and the Department in addressing the transportation needs of this growing region.
